Geo. W. Grav, of this city, informed him of the death of his brother, Dr. W. C. Gray, at the Warm Springs Reservation, some sixty miles from the Dalles, on Saturday last. Dr. W. C. Gray was resident Surgeon of the Reservation. His death was caused by a gun-shot wound, in the fleshy part of the arm. The particulars of the sad catastrophe we have not been able to obtain. Deceased was well known in this community as a young man whose future gave promise of eminent success.

LATER .- The body of Dr. Gray arrived in this city yesterday, and was buried in the Albany Cemetery the same evening. From Mr. Smith, who accompanied the remains, we learn that the accident which deprived Dr. Gray of life, occurred while he was enjoying an excursion into the mountains with a company of ladies and gentlemen. He had got out of the wagon to look for water. Failing in his search he returned, and in attempting to get into the wagon, his shot gun, which he held by the muzzle, in the left hand, struck the hind wheel of the wagon and was discharged, the shot tearing and lacerating the flesh from the wrist to midway between the elbow and shoulder. Every attention was given the unfortunate man, but without avail, and in a few brief hours he passed from earth.


