The fact of the noble donation, by Mrs. J. L. Parrish, of ten acres of land as a site upon which to creet a home for the homeless, is already known. This benevolent act was the inception of the enterprise. The society was organized, and has endeavored faithfully, thus far, to carry out the wise and beneficent design at first contemplated.

Through the united efforts of the Society, and generous sympathy of its friends, a comfortable and commodious building has been erected amid the oaks upon the beautiful grounds, and the whole surrounded by a plain, substantia fence-all of which, by cautious and economical management, is thus far un encumbered by debt.

Yet the Society find that the work ha but a beginning. The house is to be furnished; the grounds put in prope order for cultivating and beautifying; Matron to be employed and paid; child ren to be supported, &c. Several appli cations have already been made for home less ones, and one has been received, not withstanding the low state of funds.

It is to be hoped, however, by redouble exertions, that all difficulties will b overcome, and that the Society will, ver soon, be able to meet every worthy de

To further these plans it is, therefore thought advisable to make a special effor during the coming State Fair, whe there will be brought together from ever quarter of our State, those whom, w trust, will be ready and willing to lend a helping hand to a cause in which all should feel deeply interested.

The Society, therefore, proposes to erect a suitable building upon the State themselves to open a first-class "Restaurant," by which, together with the sale, of useful and fancy articles, they hope to raise a fund that will do much towards carrying forwards this good work. And they would respectfully and earnestly solicit every one to join them in this needful enterprise. Both young and old, great assistance by each bringing with them and contributing but a small portion of produce from their, wares from stores or shops, and handywork of others.
