AGRICULTURAL.

Dr. Long, of Alton, Ill., says that mulching evergreens after setting out is indispensable to their growth.

He succeeds best with Norway Spruce and Arbor Vitae. Lost but three per cent. of well rooted trees when mulched.

When practicable evergreens should be shaded after setting out, in all sunny weather.

THE HORSE.

Referring to this noble animal, the Turf, Field and Farm states that when the horse is asleep one ear is generally directed forward and the other backward, in order to catch the faintest sound that may come from either direction.

And at night, when on the march in company, we are told that "those in front direct their ears forward, those in the rear backward, and those in the center turn them laterally or across, the whole troop feeling thus to be actuated by one feeling, which watches the general safety."

The idea is a beautiful one, whether it rests on romance or not. Apprehension for the mass bespeaks generosity of heart, and to see each individual become the watch and safeguard for the whole, is to recognize a feeling that must be pleasing in the sight of God.

PAPER HOUSES.

Passing along the street the other day, the writer's curiosity was excited by seeing a small house on the side-walk.

Was it a model of some famous man's domicile, or had it been used in a political procession, or figured at a County or State Fair? Or was it put there as a sample of how houses should be built?

On examination, the writer found that the roof, sides and floor were covered with compacted paper or pasteboard saturated with tar and impervious to air and water, and a non conductor of heat and cold, making it cool in summer and warm in winter, and protecting the house against vermin.

It is put on the studs under sheathing boards before clappingboard, or on the inside of the studs before lathing, or on the lath, and papered instead of plastering, like any wall, on the joists under the floors—to keep out cold and noise—and on roofs, under shingles or slates, or instead of felt for a gavel roof.

And it is so cheap that a house 25 feet by 50, and 20 feet high, can be covered with it, and made air and water tight, and as warm as a brick house, for about twenty-five dollars.

The paper can be used before saturation for the inside of rooms, instead of plaster, and be papered or whitewashed.

Oat Meal Cake—Wet meal with water. Cut in small shapes, with a cooked rasin in the middle. Bake in the oven.
