LOCAL AFFAIRS

RAILROAD.—Work on the bridge at the crossing of the Santiam is progressing rapidly, and the bridge will probably be fully completed by the last of next week. The grading to Jefferson will be finished the present week, ready for the iron. On Monday the stages were connecting with the railroad seven miles from Salem, but the track was laid to a point within four miles of Salem. Ben. Holladay says it is his intention never to let up a moment until the road is finished to the 100 mile stake, a point about six miles this side of Harrisburg.

LATEST.—The cars are now running to Salem. A large quantity of iron for the O & C. R. R. arrived at San Francisco some days since, which was to have quick dispatch to Portland. When this iron arrives there will be sufficient to complete the road to this city.

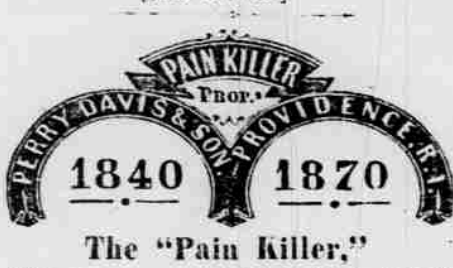
