## LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES.

PARSED AT THE SECOND SESSION OF THE FORTY-FIRE COSGRESS.

[Public-No. 183]

AN ACT making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the government for the year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress Assembled :

That the following some be, and the same are hereby, appropriated, for the ojects herein after expressed, for the fiscal year ending the mirrieth June, eighteen hundred and seventy-

SUPERVISING INSPECTORS OF STEAM VESSELS.

For carrying out the provisions of the acts of the thirtieth August, eighteen hundred and tifty-two, for the better protection of the lives of passengers on vessels propelled in whole or in part by steam, and of the acts amendatory thereof the following sums, viz:
