

The Bar-Keeper's Story.

A few years ago I was stopping for a time in a village in the central portion of New York State, and during my stay a series of meetings were started under the supervision of Elder Jacob Knapp, the Baptist Revivalist. After a period the interest became very marked and spread into all portions of the town. Business for some days was entirely stopped, to give the days was entirely stopped, to give the people the better opportunity to "seek their souls' salvation." Prayer meetings were instituted in various parts of the town; and flually a noon prayer meeting was begun in the bar-room of the principal hotel. The hotel keeper not only made no objection, but even encouraged and assisted those who at-tended and carried on the meeting.

One of the results of the prayer meeting was the delivery of a Temperance sermon, by Elder Knapp, in which he related various incidents which had passed under his own observations, tending to illustrate his subject; and among others gave the following narration:

"A rumseller rose one night in my congregation and said: I have sold liquor for many years. I have been the cause of much ruin and degradation, of great sorrow and inisery. Only yesterday a man bought liquor at my bar, went out and started for

Only yestering a man bought liquor at my bar, went out and started for home. He had gone but a short way when be fell and broke his leg. He was taken up and brought into my sitting-room. His leg was found to be so badly broken, that amputation be so taday broken, this ampliance became necessary. The surgeon was brought and very soon the operation was performed. As I looked at the limb, after it was removed, I thought: That is my work.

"I have done mischlef among every class. One day a few years since, a young man came into the bar-room and demanded brandy. I knew him. He was from one of the most respected families in the town. He was a graduate of a college, a man of ability, of wealth, of refinement and of great promise. He demanded liquor. I felt that I ought not to let him have it: but I wanted his money so I poured it out. Soon he returned and asked for another glass of brandy. Again I felt-I ought not to let him have it, yet again for his money I poured it out to him. Soon the third time he returned. and demanded the third glass of bran-dy, and though I felt again companc-tions of conscience I supplied him with the damning staff and he retired.

"Soon after, having occasion to go out of my bar-room, as I went toward the barn, I saw my customer leaning against a post. As I approached him, he shuddered and appeared frightened, and at the same time cried out: 'Don't hurt me, don't hurt me!' i told him I wouldn't, persuaded him to go into the botel, took him up to a spare room in the second story and put him to bed.

"I thought no more about him. The next morning a friend of hiscame in and made inquiries concerning him. Something within me, I can't tell what it was, made me reply the ladead.' I then told him of the occurdead.' I then told him or the occur-rence of the previous day, at the same time leading the way up stairs. We advanced to the room and entered. We turned down the clothing of the bed, and there lay what was left of the once noble young man, cold, stark, dead!

"I shrank away, for it seemed as though I was his murderer. But t

though I was his murderer. But I did not cease selling rum, for I could not give up the idea of making money. Oh! If some strong hand had been interposed, if some strong has had said thou shalt not do it, I might perhaps have been saved, but now I shall go down to my grave feeling, in my soul that I am a murderer! Such were the words of a rumselier, in that revival meeting of Elder Knapp, and I thought when I heard him tell it—could we desire, and if we did, could we have a stronger argudid, could we have a stronger argu-ment in favor of prohibition? We would protect the man who drinks, by telling him be shall not have it; but here is a man who sells, and I doubt

here is a man who sells, and I doubt not there are thousands of others, who would be protected from the sin of selling and from the perpetration of crime arising out of the act, by a law which shall prohibit him from continuing in his traffic.

"But," Optimist asks, "why does he not stop selling?" For the same reason, that you do not stop your business—he wishes to make money.
"But is he to make money at the expense of his soul?" "By no means. "But is he to make money at the expense of his soul?" "By no means, but so long as humanity is the poor weak humanity it is now, just so long will money be the "root of all evil" to it, and just so long will men harter their eternal happiness to gain it, and the question for us to consider, is whether or not we are free from guilt and are not inperiling our soul when we let them do it? If a man stand by and let his brother man kill his neighbor, he is held equally guilty of the murder, and so shall you and I optimist, if we stand by our brothers, and allow them to murder other of our fellow beings, be held guilty? Will the crime entirely rest upon the rum-seller, or shall we find that we in lifting the skirts of our garments and in maying afar off that we might bet him alone, nevertheless spotted them with the convicting and condemning blood?
