A Disastrous Explosion.

A most disastrous and terrible steamboat explosion occurred recently near Brooks' Point, thirty miles above Cairo, Illinois. The steamer *Oceanus* exploded her boiler, blowing her upper works almost entirely away, after which the wreck took fire, burning to the water's edge. The boat had forty passengers, making with the crew about one hundred persons on board, about eighty of whom are supposed to have been lost. The effect of the explosion is described as terrific beyond conception, the whole upper works being lifted up bodily and falling back on the boat and in the water, completely shattered. Harry Tripp, the pilot on watch, and Captain Reeder were buried in the debris, and were heard calling for aid, but were both burned. Ten or twelve clung to the wheel, but it dropped before help reached them, and all but four perished. Some were drowned by the capsizing of a stage plank on which they had placed themselves for safety. Some were found dead floating in the river with life preservers on, supposed to have been chilled to death. The bodies of four women were seen floating past Watson's landing, but were not recovered.

The Black Hills of Dakota.

The discoveries of gold among the Black Hills of Dakota, have resulted in exciting a strong desire among old miners and prospectors to penetrate into that region. The Black Hills, however, are included within the limits of an Indian reservation. In 1865 several severe engagements were fought with the Sioux, Cheyennes and Arapahoes by a military party which penetrated into that region; and the conclusion is almost certain, that any incursion of miners into that section at this time would precipitate another Indian war. To prevent this, as well as to protect the Indian in his reservation rights, the Government has prohibited expeditions from going there. But alas for poor Lo! The mineral is there in sufficient quantities to make it a source of profit to civilized enterprise, it will not be long until the miners pick will be heard resounding among the Hills.

Earthquakes.

California, since the late disastrous earthquakes, is nervously anxious to arrive at the true theory to account for their origin. The opinion of W. T. Stewart, of San Jose, that the earthquakes are of electrical origin and influenced by meteorological causes, so much at variance with the old and uniformly accepted theory of the central fusion of the earth as the ultimate cause, very properly excited a degree of inquiry on this subject among Californians which calls for scientific investigation, and will not be appeased without it. A project has been started among property-holders in San Francisco, says the *Chronicle*, to send some scientific expert to the Lone Pine region, where the late disaster occurred, for the purpose of making a critical examination and preparing a full report of all the facts connected with the *crackles* there of last month. If the theory of Stewart is susceptible of proof, it comes within the range of science, at least within the possibilities, of discovering appliances or means by which the recurrence of earthquakes may be prevented, or their influence counteracted. It is at least a fact that quite a number of our leading scientists, including Professors Lyell and Hopkins, now refuse to accept the theory of the molten condition of the interior of the earth, as correct.
