PACIFIC COAST NEWS.
 The Portland *Bulletin* states that Mr. Henry Barmester took his gun, and started on a grouse hunt Monday before last, since which time he had not returned.

The Republican friends of Attorney General Williams at Portland will give him a becoming reception on his arrival in that city.

The *Salem Mercury* says there is an alder tree across the river, in Polk county, that is six feet and eight inches in circumference. Large.

A little girl at the East Salem school fainted and fell heavily to the floor one day last week.

Rents are low and the real estate market depressed at Salem.

Many farmers in the valley are turning their attention to sheep raising.

Charles Smith, convicted of larceny, two years ago in Wasco county, was discharged from the Penitentiary last week.

Contrary to expectation the proposition of the Committee of 100 to the St. Louis delegation for the construction of the western end of the 35th parallel road was not accepted by the latter, and a counter proposition will be presented.

Caterpillars are carrying every thing before them in Polk county. Stone for the building of the Catholic Academy at Salem is being taken from a quarry near Marshfield, in Clackamas county.

A young man in Salem loses the power of speech occasionally for seven or eight hours at a time without any apparent cause.

Gov. Grover made the following appointments of Notaries Public on Thursday last: L. O. Sterns, Baker City; A. Weller, Sparta, Union county; Samuel O. L. Potter, Portland, and Charles Knight, Canby, Clackamas county.

On the 12th of April a Mr. W. A. Turner was drowned while engaged in floating logs down a tributary of Smith river, about twenty miles from Garbner City. Mr. Turner was a native of Scotland, about twenty eight years of age. Supposed to have relatives in the vicinity of Astoria.

The annual reunion of the Alumni Association of Wallamet University, will be held in the University, June 27th, in the evening; Orator, J. B. Waldo, of Portland; Poet, Samuel L. Simpson, of Salem; Essayist, Mrs. W. C. Johnson, of Oregon City.

The Salem *Mercury* has an account of a married lady who is said to have eloped with "another man," leaving her husband and two children to the tender mercies of the cold world.

Mr. Geer of Marion county has recently placed on his farm eight head of fine blooded sheep which he purchased in Washington county, says the *Statesman*. He has a flock of some eight hundred sheep.

During the past quarter Rev. J. Hoberg, pastor of Hillsboro circuit, has received 31 members into the Church, preached 49 times, missed three appointments from sickness, made 103 pastoral visits, organized one new class at Cornelius and traveled more than 500 miles.

The mining companies are beginning work in every direction round Idaho City, the weather having moderated so as to make water quite abundant.

Mysterious disappearances are getting very common in the State. "Darling, kiss my eyelids down," is the latest pathetic lay.

It is said that spinsters have a better chance of success against widowers in the race for husbands than bachelors have against widowers in the race for wives.

Mr. Selly, of Polk county, has a little hen that lays two eggs a day, and every egg hatched has produced a rooster. Her last lay was an egg 6x9 inches, weighing five ounces.

Salem has been disturbed by burglars lately.

The *Oregonian* speaks of a couple in Portland who not long since celebrated their seventieth anniversary of their wedding day, called the "pearl wedding."

About one hundred families in and about Walls Walla intend at once to move into Idaho, and settle

on the lands north of Lewiston. A little daughter of J. E. Elder, of Olympia, recently had her leg broken by falling from a goods box.

The heavy frosts have destroyed nearly all the fruit buds in the gardens and orchards in the vicinity of Boise City.

It is reported that an American company is soon to erect a dry dock at some suitable point on the Sound.

The following appropriations have been made by Congress for the benefit of Washington Territory this year: The usual salaries for Federal officials; usual annuities for different tribes of Indians; general incidental expenses of the Indian service, \$35,000; surveying, \$70,000; assessing and collecting Internal Revenue, \$17,000; collecting revenue from public land, \$20,000.

Two convicts escaped from the Idaho Territorial prison on the 25th of April. They were Al. Priest and Ah. Gow.

Sunday before last, Wm. Chitwood, a young man residing in Sam's Valley, was accidentally shot through the abdomen by a man who was cleaning a Colts' revolver, and lived but thirty-six hours.

J. W. Johnson, of Applegate, while intoxicated, fell from his wagon, on a recent Sunday, fracturing his skull and receiving other injuries from the effect of which he died on Tuesday following.

Hay is \$150 a ton at Georgetown, Colorado.

The Ute Indians have the small pox panic and are pouring into Denver to get vaccinated. They also beg the whites to stop the snow-storms.

Multnomah county in eight years and five months has had nine hundred and eighty-six marriages. There has been an increase in these investments year by year.

Oranges were twenty-five cents a dozen in Portland last week.

It cost Portland \$80 to kill thirty dogs last month.

The survey of the St. Helens Tar has been completed.

An exchange says that Mr. Henry Kohlep, employed at the Salem Brewery, is six feet eight and one-half inches in height, and has not tasted a drop of water for three years. Drinking beer seems to have reversed its influence in this instance, and puffled him out in the wrong direction.

Salem is to have a new pump factory.

There are three saloons less in Salem than there were last month.

The Indians of Grand Ronde Reservation have established Justice's Courts, and litigation has become a passion with them.

The strife among the Democracy in Union county is represented as bitter and personal. It is expected that Hendershott will be re-nominated for the Senate and a bolt is expected.

The Committee of One Hundred at San Francisco and the St. Louis delegation have agreed on a basis of action. A company is to be incorporated at San Francisco with \$25,000,000 subscribed capital, to immediately commence the construction of the road eastward to the Colorado river and secure six per cent. 200 year city bonds under the five per cent. act, the interest of which is to be paid out of the earnings of the road as soon as finished to the Colorado river. St. Louis is to do the same for the construction of the road from the present terminus to the Colorado river. Each Company is to build at least 250 miles annually, and make the junction at an agreed point within five years from the commencement of the work. The Atlantic and Pacific Company are to concede to the San Francisco Company all rights to grants of lands, depot and terminal sites, and the Government aid of all forms for its section of the road, and if either party fails to construct its respective share of the road up to the point of junction within the time, the other is to go on with the construction until the junction is made, and receive all benefits and aid for that part of the line so constructed, to which the other would have been entitled. The terminus is to be Mission Bay. The St. Louis party are now in consultation. It is understood that the terms are satisfactory and will be accepted.
