Rules for Racing--Trotting and Running.

Rung 1.—No person shall cet as judge in any race on which he may have bet, or in which he may be interested.

Rung 2.—The person entering for a race (or

his proxy) will draw for position on the track, under the supervision of the judges. Regardation of the state of speed, only three starts will be allowed, and any person who shall fail on the third trial shall be ruled off by the

judges, but may have the privilege of going against the time of the race. RULE 4.—In trotting and pacing races, all animals to carry one hundred and forty-five pounds in addition to the vehicle.

RULE 5.—The premium will be withheld from one or both of the parties in any race, if in the

opinion of the judges it is not a fair contest, as no jockeying or foul riding or driving will be Ruls 6 .- Any animal or animals entered in

Rule 6.—Any animal or animals entered in a race may go against the time of the race, provided the intention so to do is stated to the Judges before any of the animals start. Any animal bolting or flying the track may have the same privilege.

Rele 7.—Any animal that is not in readiness

same privilege.

RULE 7.—Any animal that is not in readiness at the precise time appointed, shall forfeit all claims to the centest.

RULE 8.—The usual time between heats will be allowed. The weight for running will be—three years old, seventy-five pounds; four years old, cighty-five pounds; five years old, ninety-five pounds: six years old, one hundred and five pounds; three pounds off mares and geldings.

RULE 9.—No racing shall be allowed on the Pair Grounds, but what is ordered by the Directors and ander their control.

RULE 10.—No person shall be permitted to occupy the stand during trials of speed, but officers, judges and sach persons as may be invited by the Presiden, and no interference will be permitted in weighing riders.

RULE 11.—No race will be run without patrol judges.
