PACIFIC COAST NEWS.

Judge Gray, of Salubria, Wagon Valley, Idaho Territory, was seriously injured recently by being thrown from a horse.

The little ones of Chelalis county, W. T., are taking their turn at the whooping cough.

The Courier says that Tumwater, W. T., has the finest water power in the world. There is a fall of 80 feet in a distance of 400 yards, and at an ordinary stage of water, 40,000 cubic yards of water pass over the fall each minute.

They are having clam chowders in Portland.

Three new fire cisterns are to be constructed in Portland.

The First Baptist Church of Portland has secured a new pastor in the person of Rev. A. B. Medbury, late pastor of the First Baptist Church of San Francisco. He will enter upon his labors some time next month.

James Thompson, one of the deck hands on board the steamer Senator, was accidentally knocked overboard on Thursday last week at Oregon City, and drowned.

The women of Utah are preparing another memorial to Congress against the admission and the dominion of the Mormon Church.

Two slight shocks of earthquake were felt at Winnemucca, Nevada, on the 23d.

The will of G. C. Johnson, Consul General of Sweden and Norway, was filed for probate in San Francisco on the 21th. The estate is said to be worth \$1,000,000.

San Francisco raised \$2,515 for the Inyo sufferers.

Salt Lake authorities are making vigorous efforts to close up houses of prostitution, keepers being arrested and heavily fined.

Salem has a new brass band.

One man in Marion county advertises twenty tons of carrots for sale.

Newport, on Yaquina Bay, is prospering. The demand for houses is greater than the supply.

A woman of the *debut monde*, known as Kitty King, committed suicide at Quartzburg recently by taking an overdose of morphine.

The total value of real and personal property in King county, W. T., is \$1,495,073, or nearly half a million more than last year.

The celebration of the 4th of July at the Dayton camp ground promises to be a grand affair. Fourteen Sunday Schools are to be present.

Leonard Bittell has been appointed Postmaster at Looking Glass, Douglas county.

Mr. William Delaney, of Marion county, owns a clock which has been running for seventy-five years. It was brought to Oregon in 1847.

Sweet Vengeance is the classic name of a town in Yuba county Cal.

Mr. R. Yost, owner of the Portland Sausage Factory, Portland, caught a Chinaman in his factory a few days since, endeavoring to make away with a couple of hams. As the thief attempted to escape through the open window, Mr. Yost came down on him with a club, which detained him until a good flagellation had been administered. He was then permitted to depart.

Capital Lodge, I.O.G.T., at Salem, has a new set of officers' regalia, which cost \$150.

One thousand dollars have been subscribed by the citizens of Corvallis toward the purchase of a fire engine. There are ninety prisoners at present in the State Prison, all kept at work but three or four.

Mormon police are exciting public indignation by using brass knuckles. Murders and robberies are still frequent through the Indian country.

The *Evening* says forty miles of railroad will be built south of Roseburg this summer.

A faro game, monte game, chuck-a-luck and many other games are kept up in Roseburg.

Col. Cornelius will speak at Astoria this week.

The Willamette valley is sending cattle, sheep, and horses to the grazing fields of bunch grass in Eastern Oregon by every boat.

The Washington correspondent of the *State Journal*, under date of May 8th, says: "Last Monday the Senate confirmed E. B. Watson to be Register of the Land Office at Linkville, in Southeastern Oregon. Mr. Watson has telegraphed to Senator Corbett that he resigns the office, or declines to accept. The names of two gentlemen have been proposed for Register and Receiver, who will probably be appointed."

The *Englewood Journal* of the 25th inst. says: "A woman by the name of Mrs. Edwards arrived here on Wednesday evening. In search of her husband, Edwards, who is a painter, and has been working here a short time. She claims that they were married in San Francisco; that Edwards has a wife somewhere in the East. She wishes to find him and give the State an opportunity to take care of him for a few years. Edwards left here on Monday, probably on hearing that his wife was after him. When here he went under the name of Frank Ames."

Charles Drain has been appointed a Notary Public for Douglas county. A new postoffice has been established at Slough City, W. T., and Mr. Alphin has been appointed postmaster.

The *Dallas Republican*, Polk county, says: Immigrants are constantly arriving from the East and California. Mr. Nelson informs us that several families have recently come into his neighborhood, near Independence, from Illinois. All staunch Republicans.

Five hundred dollars were stolen from Mr. Hoag, a storekeeper at Clatskanie, W. T., on the night of the 18th inst.

The gold placer diggings at Brigham Canon, Utah, yield as high as forty cents to the pan. The common average is \$10 to \$15 per day to the land. Three new quartz mills and seven smelting furnaces have been contracted for, to be built at the aggregate expense of a quarter of a million dollars.

The *Lewiston Signal* says: "It is strongly hinted that certain parties in this city are in the habit of selling flour to Indians under the cognomen of 'Skookum flour,' each sack containing from one to two bottles of whisky. The Indians, of course, know the brand and readily purchase at an advance price of from one to five dollars."

The Secretary of War has recommended an appropriation of \$120,000 for the erection of a five company military post near Beaver City, Southern Utah, 200 miles from Salt Lake City.

Witnesses who were present at the Mountain Meadow massacre, in which over one hundred and twenty innocent men, women and children were slaughtered in the most barbarous manner, feel that their lives would be rendered insecure should they testify to the facts; but they say that whenever the Government of the United States will guarantee them protection they will freely testify to all the facts. Associate Justice Hawley says that he is fully satisfied, from his experience in that district for the last three years as the judicial officer of the Court, that their feeling of insecurity is well founded, and that it will require a military force established in that district, say at the city of Beaver, of at least five companies. This recommendation is endorsed by Governor Wood and General Ord.

Colonel B. B. Taylor, editor of the *Portland Herald*, has received and accepted the invitation to deliver the annual address before the literary societies of Wallamet University, on the 25th of next month.

The *Mercury* says wheat is selling at the Salem mills at 55 cents per bushel.

One day last week the cabin of Jas. Irwin, a miner in Rye Valley, Eastern Oregon, was burned to the ground, together with its contents. Total loss about \$400. Supposed to be the work of an incendiary.

The following are the appointed officers of the Grand Lodge of Odd Fellow: W. G. C., J. F. Backensto, of Albany No. 4; W. G. M., E. M. Bamford, of Blue Mountain No. 11; W. G. C., William M. Hand, of Columbia No. 5; W. G. G., J. G. Wright, of Chemeketa No. 1; W. G. H., John Boston, of Occidental No. 30.

At the last meeting of the Board of Trustees of Corvallis College, President Finley tendered his resignation, to take effect at the close of the present term. The resignation was accepted, and a committee appointed to correspond with parties East relative to filling his place.

A fatal accident happened to the wife of Mr. Oliver, living on the Meadows in Umatilla county, one day last week. Mr. Oliver was away from home and left a horse picketed near the house. In the evening his wife took the horse to the well for the purpose of watering it, and it is supposed the horse became frightened, and entangling her in the rope, ran the distance of three-fourths of a mile, tearing off all her clothes and breaking her arms and neck. When found by a neighbor the next morning, she could not be identified, until upon going to the house, where her three little children were found asleep on the bed with their clothes on, having been alone all night.

The soldiers stationed at Fort Boise have made fine gardens this spring, which they must now give up, as they are ordered to Arizona.

The *Oregonian* says: Dr. Bourne, who has delivered two lectures in this city, started for Sacramento, California, yesterday morning. He intends to complete the entire distance on foot, and lecture at the various towns through which he will pass. He carried over forty pounds of provisions and clothing on his shoulders. The Doctor is purely a vegetarian in his diet, and his pilgrimage on foot is to demonstrate the fact that meat is not necessary to maintain physical endurance.

An Arkansas paper says that a widow Fay, of Oregon, has set up a cigar manufactory, and her weeds are said to be the best in the State.

In the M. E. General Conference, May 6th, George Abernethy presented a memorial on the subject of an Oregon member of the Mission Committee, from the Pacific coast; also a paper on the matter of the division of the Oregon Conference; also a resolution of the Conference, asking a change in the Discipline prohibiting the introduction on trial in an Annual Conference of any member who smokes or chews tobacco. Rev. John F. Devore presented a paper on the Pacific Christian Advocate, and a book depository for Oregon; also an extract from the Conference journals on the subject of depository for Oregon.

Out west, the new synonym for "trotting" is "colfaxing." Parents no longer admonish their children that it is "time to go to bed," but tenderly observe, "My darling, it is time you colfaxed."
