GRANT AND WILSON.

The Republican National Convention at Philadelphia last week nominated Gen. Grant for President and Senator Wilson, of Massachusetts, for Vice President. Grant was nominated by acclamation and Wilson on the first ballot. The ticket is a strong one. No better or popular name for President could have been selected for the suffrages of the Republican party, than that of Grant. The unanimity which characterized the choice of the Convention in voting for him, may be regarded as a correct symbolization of the feeling of the entire Republican party. Gen. Grant has excited both the love and admiration of the people. No opposer of his can convince the intelligent citizen that he is not a man of ability as well as virtue. He looks at Grant's military experience, and sees not only great ability there in organizing, controlling and directing armies, but he also witnesses great modesty, sterling integrity, and sincere humanity. The people learned to love the man that was always so earnest and confident, brave and true. His political views, too, are equally worthy of admiration and confidence. Search them through, and they will be found to bear the stamp of wisdom and judiciousness, as well as the impress of progressiveness. In his messages, he gives his views clearly and concisely on every subject of real interest to the nation. Upon the subject of education he has ever taken broad and liberal views. So too of agriculture, commerce, manufactures, tariff, amnesty and reconstruction, the workingman, Indian policy, the land grant policy, civil service reform, payment and refunding the national debt, etc. Upon all these questions, and others, his views have been well digested and clearly expressed in his messages, and many of them have been carried into practical effect, and are now a part of the law of the land. His administration in the past has been a most gratifying success. No stronger evidence of this need be sought than in the fact that peace and prosperity now prevail where discord and stagnation existed. Then, too, the unanimity which now characterizes the feeling of the Republican hosts, North, South, East and West, in their support of Grant, in spite of the efforts of a few renegades from the party, is a most convincing evidence of the hold which his administration has obtained upon popular favor. The party rally around him to-day as a unit, and support him with enthusiasm. The nomination of Senator Wilson was not so much of a foregone conclusion, as that of Grant, though it was not entirely unexpected. He is one of the purest and most talented men in the Republican party. This secures the hearty endorsement of the entire party. No other man would have made the ticket stronger. He has had long experience in public life, and his loyalty to Republican principles and policy is unimpeachable. The ticket will sweep the country. Whether the Democratic party endorse Greeley, or bring out some other candidate, it matters not. The Republican party, strong in numbers and in unity, will elect Grant and Wilson without a peradventure by an overwhelming majority.

Greeley is in favor of the one man principle. Should he be elected to the Presidency, no doubt the whole nation will become clamorous for it long before his term expires.

Our Neighbor on the Rampage.

Our neighbor of the *Democrat* is extremely fretted over the result of the State election. He cannot conceal his emotions of deep chagrin and anguish. The longer he talks the more petulant he becomes. He tries to be philosophical, but only snaps and grumbles and scolds. He strains every nerve to keep cool, but the thing is too hot for him. It hurts. Look at it. He did hope the people would not endorse the party with which the "mercenary railroad monopolist" affiliates with, but they did. Therefore, wails out Brown, "Oregon has fallen." Yes, she's "busted;" "played;" "gone where the woodbine twined;" "gone in;" "passed in her checks;" "died in the last ditch;" "killed unmercifully." Brown (not "woodpecker" Brown on the ticket with Greeley), but Brown of the *Democrat*, says so. Be appalled, O earth! Cry out rocks, and weep ye quadrupeds and insects! Oregon is no more. We would weep with our afflicted neighbor, and volunteer a few agonizing shrieks, like his, if we thought "Webfoot" had gone up the flume; but we will be charitable towards our neighbor, and think he meant "Democracy has fallen," instead of "Oregon has fallen." Giving it such an interpretation we come not down with any of our brine. Brown may weep his water-closets of tears empty, if he insists on it, but weep not us. We are no Democrat, and 'tint our funeral. We run no Ligeia organ, and our bread and butter isn't imperiled. We lost no bets, so it does not pinch us a particle. In fact, we rather rejoice in the cause of our neighbor's affliction. We are rather glad that Democracy in this State "has fallen." We think it altogether outlived its usefulness. If it had fallen years ago, before it committed so many errors and crimes, the State would have been much better off, and the people happier. Then Brown wouldn't have had all of his present bitterness and anguish to pass through. Yes, neighbor, Democracy has indeed fallen in Oregon. We do not wish to intensify your burning anguish, or add to the grief which now suffuses your eyes; but may we not suggest that there is great reason to think that the fall experienced by Democracy in this State, in the late election, was a *dead fall*. Lifeless it fell, and dead as a mackerel it will remain. Your clarion voice will no longer be heard "marshaling the Democratic Klans." No more will the "Democratic watch fires" be "kindled" as the result of your words of marshaling cheer. No, no, Brown, we told you some time ago how it would be. You will soon be blowing a Greeley-Brown tooth-born. Yes you will, neighbor, and you will blow it *loud* and *long*, because you never lacked for wind. Peace to your memory, Brown, as a Democrat.

Grant is Safe.

The people of the country are more indebted to General Grant for the preservation of the Union than to any other individual. It was to his military genius that the country was saved from destruction. He it was who laid the plans which resulted in victory. It was his determination, his hopeful, cheerful activity, ever sanguine of success, never doubting of complete triumph, which inspired the loyal heart of the nation with courage, and enabled it to strike with spirit. Since his elevation to the Presidency, his policy, so modest and unassuming, and yet so wise, so discreet, so honest, so just, so true, has impressed the people with a corresponding confidence in his ability and integrity, and they cheerfully seek to honor him, and benefit themselves and country, by extending his lease of Administrative power through an additional period of four years. The people feel that in his hands the country is safe. Does Greeley inspire such confidence? His political history is too full of vagaries and whimsicalities. Can't be trusted.

Funny.

The American people have no objection to a little fun now and then, even if it grows out of so important a matter as electing a President. The present campaign promises to furnish ample material in this direction. There is every reason to believe that Horace Greeley will be endorsed by the Baltimore Convention. That of itself will be ludicrous enough. To appreciate this, it is but necessary to trace out the political history of Greeley on one line, and then put along side of it the record of Democracy. Scrutinize them closely in the light of comparison, and then endeavor to amalgamate, or absorb them into each other. Does not such a union of inconsistencies, such a marriage of belligerent opposites, such an attempted unification of positive incongruities, present a picture which is monstrous, gigantic in its farcicalness? Think of goose-goose uniting with a weak conception of dishwater. Think of a gudgeon marrying a polecat. Think of a crazy elephant being joined to a dead whale, or toothless and tailless "possum" to an old "White Hat," and such contrasts are no more ridiculous than is the spectacle now being presented of Democracy rallying under the political leadership of Greeley and Brown. Just call to mind how Horace used to "go" for the Democrats, and how the Democrats anciently "went" for him. Didn't they tongue-lash, and animalize, and vituperate, and belabor, and pile mountains of condemnatory adjectives on the devoted, hairless top of Greeley's head, because of his bitter denunciations of them and their principles before and during the war? How he used to shriek, "On to Richmond!" and then how they would "cuss" him. It did them good to consign him in language to the bed-rock quarters of the infernal regions. They relished it then; but after the war was over, and Greeley had signed the bail bond of Jeff Davis, many of them began to feel more kindly towards him. Since he began, on selfish and petulant grounds, to oppose Grant, their regard for him has increased into admiration; and although the ancient Sage is still the "negro-loving," "high-protectionist" that he used to be, still he lures Grant, and Democracy is content to amalgamate with him, just for that.

Garrison on Sumner's Speech.

William Lloyd Garrison came out in an open letter sharply criticizing Senator Sumner's late speech denouncing Grant. He says it is ill-judged and ill-timed in its charges, and bitter in its personalities. He also said that Sumner does not represent Massachusetts in this sweeping impeachment, as the Republicans are almost a unit for Grant's re-election. He said that Grant is inseparable from the party, and that in attacking him the Senator really attacked the Republican party.
