

FOREIGN NEWS.

It is reported that the the Cabinet in Spain has decided on a separation of Church and State.

Elie Frederic Pery, Marshal of France, died on the 20th inst., in Paris, aged sixty-eight years.

Gladstone recently stated that the result of the labors of the Geneva tribunal would have no effect whatever on the question of the Canadian loan and San Juan boundary.

The North German Gazette says that German influence will be felt in the election of the next Pope.

In a collision at Juesoy, France, on the Orleans railroad, June 19th, thirty were injured and several killed.

The Pope has addressed a letter to Antonelli, deploring the approaching enforcement of the law suppressing convents in Italy as a violation of international law. He says that the constant encroachments of the Government of Italy on the rights of the Church violate morality and justice, and only a regard for the highest interests prevents the head of the Church from leaving Rome.

General Trenchard and Captain Averona were executed on the 15th at Port au Prince.

A Geneva special of the 22d, says that the American counsel have gone to Paris and will return with their families to Geneva. Everything betokens a long stay of the English and American representatives at Geneva.

Mail advices from Monterey to the 17th report that General Trevino had exacted another forced loan, and all foreigners unable or unwilling to pay have to work on the fortifications. The American Consul protested vainly on behalf of the citizens of the United States.

Celallos' Government forces have occupied Mirand Camargo.

The affair of Dr Howard has been officially arranged by Minister Siskles and Senor Martens, Minister of Foreign Affairs, Spain. The American Government waives the question of the claim of Dr. Howard to American citizenship.

Journals of Madrid, Spain, deny that the Government has requested the recall of Minister Siskles.

Barbers of seventeen hundred shops in New York struck, June 24th, for reduced hours of labor, from 7 A. M. to 8 P. M., with an hour for dinner. Twelve hundred shops acceded to the demand at once.

A strike among the different organizations was imminent in Boston on the 24th inst.

At a meeting of Tammany, New York, on the 24th, Horatio Seymour was made Sackem.

There is a farm house about two miles from Arnold Station, over which sadness and sorrow and terror are brooding, for in one of the rooms of the house are two strong men heavily ironed and chained to the floor.

They are waiting there for a most terrible malady to take possession of them, and after putting them to a torture a thousand times worse than that of the Inquisition, to destroy their lives.

When a mad dog, killed by Campbell, at Liberty, was on its destroying mission throughout the country, several days ago, these two men crossed its path, and received its terrible bite. The mad-dog was applied, but, fearing and doubting its efficacy, they are prepared for the fearful ordeal of an attack of hydrophobia. Not knowing at what hour the fell destroyer might make its appearance, and fearing for the safety of their wives, little ones and friends, they had heavy irons made for the purpose, and bound themselves so securely that it would require almost the strength of Sampson to break their fastenings. Their hands are securely manacled, a strong iron band is locked around their waist, and to this band is a welded heavy chain, one end of which is fastened to a heavy ring bolt in the floor—and there they stand waiting.

Waiting for the dread approach of the awful maddening stupor that announces the flow of poison through the blood and the brain; waiting for the stupor from which they will revive by the quick and sudden twitching of the muscles deadly pains in the head and body, and burning eye-balls, while poisonous froth will gather at the mouth. This is what these unfortunate men are waiting for, and there is terror in every breath they draw.

Fond wives and mothers, with tearful eyes and faltering hearts, tenderly care for them, and see that every want is supplied, and the bondage made as light as love and sympathy can render it. These loved ones are also waiting, watching, not knowing the hour when they will be drawn out of the reach of two men whose very touch may soon be instant death.

To this time no indication of madness has been manifested, and as the time has already passed in which the disorder attacks the victims after the poison has been infused into the blood the friends are very hopeful that the mad-stone has proved effective, but the men declare they will wear their irons several days yet, so fearful are they that the poison is still lurking within them.
