PACIFIC COAST NEWS.

Six jurors had been obtained in the Fair case up to the 13th inst.

Edward Cavanaugh accidentally shot himself at Vancouver the other day. He may recover.

The Juarez memorial service at San Francisco on the night of the 12th inst., was a very imposing affair.

Washington Territory has 33 miles of railroad finished from Kalama toward Olympia.

Citizens are generously offering themselves for county offices in Washington Territory as the election takes place soon.

At Yakima, corn grows at the rate of forty bushels to the acre, and many watermelons measure four feet in circumference, so said.

The Olympia Courier has been shown a bunch of wheat growing from one kernel, which he estimates to contain 35,000 grains. There is nothing like liberality in making estimates.

Cook county has a new postoffice named Ott.

Multnomah county has the potato rot.

Judge W. B. Matlock, of Clackamas county, was reported dangerously ill last week, and but little hope of his recovery.

Dr. J. B. Lee was quite severely injured by being thrown from his buggy, near Corvallis, Saturday before last.

A mile of track per day, is the progress being made on the West Side railroad. It is thought St. Joe will be reached within the present month.

Burglars are again disturbing the nocturnal serenity of the Dalles people.

Peaches are quite a drug in the Dalles market.

The people of Roseburg are expecting the railroad train to reach them next week.

Peaches are \$6 a bushel in Portland.

Mr. Welch died very suddenly at Forest Grove last week.

Monmouth College has 150 students.

Cook Bay wagon road is pronounced the best mountain road in the State.

The annual address at the State Fair, will be delivered by Wm. H. Odell, Surveyor General of the State.

Taxable property in Washington county is valued at \$1,449,475 this year. 15½ mills on the dollar is the assessment.

Rev. Jos. D. Loeck has been appointed to the pastorate of the M. E. Church in Oregon City, says the Enterprise.

Creswell, Lane county, is infested with gamblers, who fleece the country boys. A fight and a horse race recently occurred there on Sunday.

The Willamette University has over one hundred students.

The house of Mrs. J. M. Myers, of Stellacoom, was burglarized on the 9th ult., in open day, and \$500 in coin stolen.

The machinery of the woolen mill at the Dalles, which cost a year ago, some \$15,000, has been sold to a company for \$7,000.

Fifty-five deaths occurred in San Francisco last week.

Ten jurors had been obtained in the Fair case up to the 16th.

Newly discovered gold mines near Havilah, Cal., have been found, and great excitement at Los Angeles is the result.

An old ship is being exhumed in one of the streets of Frisco. In her hold was found a basket of Champagne.

If the Republicans carry Nevada, J. P. Jones will be the next Senator, it is predicted.

Immense damage has been done to the grain crops all over Idaho Territory by the late rains.

From Whatcom to Semichmo, W. T., sixteen miles, a road is being surveyed.

The famous Arizona diamonds are said to command about one dollar a bushel in the home market.

Washington Territory owes about \$22,359, 63, and has \$950 46 to pay it with.

Over one thousand patents for land claimants have been received at the Olympia land office during the past month.

Thos. O. Spring was found dead in the woods near Deer Lodge City, M. T., on the 20th ult. Hemorrhage is supposed to be the cause.

A vein of good coal has been discovered about twelve miles from Baker City.

Volney V. Smith, son of the late Hon. Delazon Smith, of this State, is the Radical Republican candidate for Lieut. Governor of Arkansas.

In the Statesman we read that Mrs. Thos. Cross, a lady highly esteemed in Salem, received injuries last Monday from being thrown from a wagon while the horses were running away, which in a short time after resulted in her death.

The members of the legislature have been furnished with complimentary tickets to the State Fair.

Houses are in demand at Baker City.

From the Oregonian we read that by the running away of a horse attached to an express wagon, last Saturday evening, the driver, named Miller, received injuries from which he died.

Hon. Jos. G. Wilson was in Salem last Tuesday.

Peter Otterdorf, of Jacksonville, was thrown out of a carriage the other night, and suffered the breaking of a rib and other injuries.

DEATH ON A TIGHT-ROPE.—The

Evansville (Ind.) Courier of July 1st has the following: Connected with Keane's Rip Van Winkle Combination was a young lady billed as "M'ile Celestine, the world-renowned lady rope walker," whose duty it was to give a free exhibition of her skill, outside of the tent, just previous to each performance. The company showed in Shawneetown on Thursday, and in the evening M'ile Celestine was giving her part of the performance on a rope stretched from the ground to the top of the tent centre-pole, which is about fifty feet high. The young lady was on the rope near the upper end, balancing on one foot, when the rope suddenly parted and she fell to the ground with terrible force. A subsequent investigation proved the rope to have been cut near the ground, and so recently as to leave no doubt of its having been done while the performer was going through her naturally dangerous performance. Medical aid was summoned, and an examination developed the fact that M'ile Celestine had doubtless received mortal injuries. One of her legs was broken in two or three places; an arm and her jawbone were also broken, and all of her teeth knocked out. In addition to this, she sustained internal injuries, and when Captain Fowler passed Shawneetown early yesterday morning, the unfortunate girl was still alive, but no hopes of her recovery were entertained. The citizens were terribly incensed, and it is thought that the fiend who cut the rope is found he will be lynched without ceremony. There was a rumor that the deed was the result of jealous madness in the heart of an admirer of the lady.
