FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL.

Gold 113 3/4. Legal tenders 87 3/8c. The latest from San Francisco gives no encouragement as to an early advance of present prices for wheat.

While prices in Liverpool still continue good, a fraction higher than for the same period last year, there is not shipping enough to carry off our surplus wheat, and the prices for freight on shipping at present offering is too high to enable shippers to pay any further advance. It has been stated to us that much larger amounts of wheat have changed hands at 55c than could be obtained when prices ruled 5c higher.

Portland prices give wheat at \$1 40 delivered; Oats \$1 25 @ 1 35 @ 100 lb; eggs 30c @ dozen; chickens \$5 @ 5 50. No change in Albany markets.
