POLITICAL DISCUSSION.—The political discussion on Wednesday evening at the Court House, was opened by Judge Shattuck, Democratic candidate for Presidential Elector. The Judge found it extremely hard to make a Democratic speech, and we believe we tell the unvarnished truth, the verdict of the majority present on the occasion, when we state that the effort was without argument, pointlessness, and below the average Democratic effort of the canvass. W. D. Hare, Esq., Republican candidate on the electoral ticket, followed in an able, pointed, argumentative, forcible speech—in fact, generally conceded to have been the best effort of the canvass, and was received with round after round of applause. He so utterly demolished Judge Shattuck, that when the latter, at the close of Mr. Hare's remarks, arose to reply, the audience almost en masse commenced retiring from the house. We are satisfied Judge Shattuck did his "level best," but laboring as he was in a poor cause, and being so greatly overmatched intellectually by his opponent, is our excuse for his poor effort on the occasion.

RESIGNATION—ELECTION.—At an adjourned meeting of the City Council, held at the Council Chamber on Tuesday evening, the resignation of N. H. Cranor, Mayor, was received and accepted, and Mart. V. Brown, Esq., of the *Democrat*, elected to fill the vacancy. The following resolution was then offered and passed without a dissenting vote:

Resolved, That we, the members of the Common Council of the city of Albany, in justice to ourselves and in behalf of the citizens of this city, hereby extend our warmest thanks to Hon. N. H. Cranor for the faithful, impartial and able manner in which he has discharged the duties of Mayor of the city of Albany during his incumbency of the office.

HARRISBURG CORRESPONDENCE.

HARRISBURG, Oct. 30, 1872.

ED. REGISTER:—It has been some time since I have seen any report of the amount of wheat on hands at this place, and as almost every other village in the valley is sending forth such reports, I thought Harrisburg ought not to be behind in this particular. The grain is about all hauled in and we can now arrive at the amount with some degree of accuracy, which is as follows:

Smith, Gerst & Co. (mill).....53,911 bush
Levy, Seller & Co.....20,500 "

Total.....74,411 bush
To this may be added, for oats and barley, bought and stored by Levy, Seller & Co., 4,000 bushels, do. do. by Smith, Brasfield & Co., 1,995 bushels, making the total amount of grain brought to this place, 84,376 bushels. This amount might have been greatly increased had there been sufficient storage room.
