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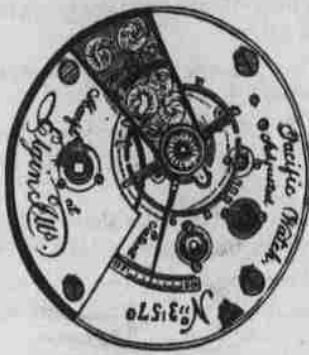

The latest freak of nature is a five legged dog at Portland.

Commissions were made out at the Executive office on the 21st, for the following persons: J. W. Mack, Lebanon, Linn county, Notary Public...

Hon. O. D. Andrews, member from Union county in the last Legislature of Oregon, died at his home near La Grande on the 14th inst.

It costs thirty-five cents per pound to carry Government freight from Roseburg to the headquarters of the troops in the Modoc country.

A Medical Association for Washington Territory is being organized at Olympia.

The Oregon Volunteer Militia, at Portland, have been supplied with the new patent American needle gun.

The wolves having killed two mules and an ox for Thomas Smith, of Auburn, Baker county, lately, he put out strichine and killed eleven of them.

The Methodist church at Empire City owes \$700, and is about to be sold to pay it, there being but two members, and they empty handed.

N. J. Yesler, Esq., of Seattle, pays \$1,296 taxes a year on real and personal property.

During last year, 1,483 persons were arrested in Salt Lake City by the police, which implies saintly unrest instead of rest.

At Walla Walla large quantities of flour are being stored.

Dr. W. B. Jones, of West Paradise Valley, Idaho, reports everything lovely in the valley, and not a hoof lost since the advent of ye winter.

A bill giving to Idaho county a portion of Nez Perce passed both branches of the Idaho Legislature.

A lumber yard is to be started at Hillsboro.

The Methodist Church in Olympia was in the midst of gracious revival of religion last week.

In Eastern Washington Territory the prospects for a good crop of grain were never better than now.

The store of J. Baur, Walla Walla, was burglarized on the night of the 17th, and \$1,650 taken from the safe.

The key to the safe was taken from the pants of a brother of Mr. Baur, who was sleeping in the store at the time.

Thomas Griston, of San Francisco, cut his throat on the 23d, and it may stop his breathing entirely.

At Ballast Point, Cal., two whales were killed the other day.

One of the proprietors of the Flying Bakery, San Francisco, shot himself in the face accidentally on the 23d, and he may live.

Hon. O. L. Slifer, formerly Judge of the Supreme Court of California, died in Florence, Italy, on the 23d.

The fire devil devoured two dwellings at Reno, Cal., on the 23d.

Epiizootic was spreading throughout the Utah Territory last week. Was seriously deranging business.

The wine product of Los Angeles county, Cal., is estimated at 1,400,000 gallons.

The wounded of the late Indian fight were all doing well on the 24th inst. Gen. Wheaton had established headquarters at the Lone Tree on Lost River.

J. S. McDonald's saloon at Oregon City was robbed of \$750 in money and 250 cigars one night last week.

The Salem printers are going to do their full part towards the Greeley monument.

Oregon City is fretted over mischief-making hoodlums.

Clubs now being formed by Oregon farmers are large and numerous.

The Territorial treasury at Olympia has \$10,000 in it. The Treasurer is ready to pay warrants.

Five hundred miles of irrigating canals have been surveyed in Colorado during the last three months.

The bravest man yet discovered is the Olympia chap who imagined that he heard a noise the other night, and carefully avoiding disturbing his wife, crept out on the roof with a pistol and staid there all night.

The following is said to have occurred at Boise City a short time ago: A gentleman sat down to supper, and pointing to an object he had discovered in the hash, indignantly inquired of the waiter: "What do you call that?"

"That," said the waiter, "appears to be a wrist-band, with a sleeve button attached." "Well," said the customer in wrath, "do you think that a proper thing for a man to find in his hash?" Chas. A. Russell, of San Francisco, the murderer of James Cratty, has been sentenced to be hung on the 21st of March next.

A party of eleven tourists, from England, on a trip around the world, arrived in Salt Lake not long since.

Col. Perry who was seriously wounded in the Modoc fight, was taken to his quarters at Camp Harney.

The University Academy at Wilbur has seventy-five students, and is rapidly building up.

From the Bulletin we learn that by invitation of Dr. Hawthorne, Supt. of the Insane Asylum at East Portland, the East Portland Band played for the amusement and pleasure of the unfortunate inmates of the Asylum, last Saturday evening.

The entertainment was highly relished by the inmates, some fifty times being played, as they called for them. Dr. Hawthorne then invited the band out to a fine collation spread for the occasion.

A laborer on the pilot boat Astoria, named Caleb H. Winter, was drowned on the Columbia river Bar on Thursday of last week.

The Jacksonville Sentinel has this: A lucky and quite unlooked for accident is reported to have arrested Cap-

tain Jack's attention at the close of the late battle, and enabled the defeated and scattered party to concentrate and make a defense. In the precipitate "withdrawal" from the lava beds, Maj. Gen. John F. Miller accidentally dropped a book of blank vouchers, already signed, which was picked up by an Indian and carried to Jack's headquarters. The chief mistook it for a book of bank checks and called a council of the braves to determine what bank they should present them to for payment, and the soldiers made their escape during the consultation. That will more than ever convince Jack that "a little learning is a dangerous thing."

The Jacksonville Sentinel says that at no time in the history of that place, has so much interest been taken in the Sunday School. It thinks the interest is not likely to abate.

The M. E. Church Sunday School at Corvallis is succeeding finely. It now has 130 pupils.

McMinnville has two flouring mills, one planing mill, four dry goods stores, two drug stores, one harness shop, two boot and shoe shops, one hotel, one paint shop, one butcher shop and a picture gallery.

Fourteen sacks of mail were sent on the Ajax last Saturday from the Portland Post Office.

Sickness is abating in Douglas county.

A man named Thompson died of delirium tremens at Eugene City last week.

The revival continues at the M. E. Church at Salem. New accessions are made every night.

Eugene City with a population of 1,500, has churches worth \$8,000.

It is thought large numbers of fish, will pass through the Locks at Oregon City, and fishing be better above the falls than usual.

Douglas county is sowing a larger area of grain than usual.

Corvallis College is enjoying fine prosperity.

In the late Modoc fight the troops captured five Indian ponies laden with government hard bread, supposed to have been captured or stolen from the troops that came from Camp Bidwell some time since.

The Corvallis Gazette has the following concerning a "land mollie" in Benton county: "In consequence of some misunderstanding or blunder somewhere about 240 acres of valuable land, including in the farm known as Gird's Station, 12 miles south of this place, has been seized by the east side railroad company and a patent received therefor. Two hundred acres belonging to William Gird and forty to George W. Houck, of this place. As near as we can understand the matter stands thus: When the final proof was made upon this land under the 'Donation act,' the Willamette Valley and Southern Oregon were included in the Oregon City District. When the Roseburg District was created it cut this farm through the center, leaving one half in each district. Final proof had been regularly made upon the whole tract in the former district, and when the latter district was created the fact was not properly reported to that office, and hence it appeared upon the plat as vacant land, and was seized upon under the railroad grant. On last Monday the parties interested had the land surveyed, and will take legal steps to hold the same."

Professors Long and Coe, and Mr. Hull, of the Bulletin, all of San Francisco, made a balloon ascension from Woodward Gardens, on the 25th, in the presence of about 500 people. When last heard from they had landed in the tide marshes east of Redwood City.

There were 82 deaths in San Francisco last week.

An attempt was made by some one to fire the garrison at Vancouver on Tuesday last, but timely discovery prevented conflagration.

Two detachments of U. S. soldiers, belonging to the 4th Artillery, arrived in Portland last Saturday, and were transferred and sent at once to the Modoc country, says the Oregonian.

Hon. J. H. Mitchell took his departure from Portland for San Francisco last Saturday on the steamer Ajax. A salute of thirteen guns were fired in honor of the event. A large crowd were present to witness the departure, and bid the honorable gentleman good-bye.
