EASTERN NEWS.

The President has re-appointed Hiram Price, and J. T. Wilson, of Iowa, J. C. Harrison, of Indiana, J. H. Millard, of Nebraska, and D. S. Ruddock, of Connecticut, Government Directors of the Union Pacific Railroad.

A miner named August Mayford, of Scranton, Pa., committed suicide one day last week by precipitating himself down a shaft 400 feet deep.

Congressman W. R. Roberts, of New York City, has directed his back pay as member of the 42d Congress to be paid into the Treasury of the United States. Merrick, of Maryland, is also reported as refusing his, and Hoar, of Massachusetts, turned his over to charities.

Senator Sumner has congratulated Boutwell on his election to the Senate by the Massachusetts Legislature in these words: "I congratulate my country, I congratulate my State and I congratulate myself, in having you for a colleague."

The Senate has confirmed the nomination of T. B. Riskey as Postmaster at Salem.

A Washington special says of E. Payson Smith, whom the President has recently appointed Commissioner of Indian Affairs, that before the war he was a Congregational preacher in the West. During the rebellion he was field agent of the Christian Commission. He is now agent of the Chippewa Indians in Minnesota. The Peace Commission nominated him, and his friends report him honest and capable.

Ketdama, a Japanese law student in Washington, has been elected to deacon's orders by the Baltimore Methodist Conference, and admitted to full connexion. He will soon return to Japan.

The President had gone to Philadelphia on the 13th inst.

The franking privilege cost the Government \$732 per year for each member of the house.

In an interview with a reporter on the 12th inst., President Grant said that no changes are to take place in the Cabinet beyond that which Boutwell's resignation will occasion. The financial policy will not be changed. He hopes to see the Republic of Spain well established, and thinks by the end of this year the independence of Cuba will be secured. No trouble is expected with Haytiens, and the President thinks that the Samana Bay scheme will result in the development of that country, so that our Government will ultimately annex it for something like ten or fifteen million dollars. The people of Utah, he says, will obey the laws. He is satisfied with his Louisiana policy. The Indian policy succeeds so well, that he has the greatest faith in it. A visit to St. Louis is projected.

Mrs. Putnam denies the scandalous rumor that she received money to influence her to petition for the commutation of Foster's sentence.

The Pomeroy Investigation Committee of the Kansas State Legislature, reported March 6th. A majority report signed by four members find Pomeroy guilty of bribery in attempting to corrupt members of the Legislature by offers of money. The minority report signed by three members, find the charges of bribery against Pomeroy not proven. The minority report was adopted by the House and majority report by the Senate.
