

PASSED AT THE THIRD SESSION OF THE FORTY-SECOND CONGRESS.

General Nature- No. 4.] AN ACT to provide for holding a flourned terms of the supreme court of Arizo-

na.

Be it enacted by the S-nate and House of R-persontaires of the United States of America in Comerca and subtle. This is the supreme court of the Territory of Arizona may hold abjourned terms thereof at any time and clace in suid Territory agreed upon by a majority of the judges of said court at any regular term thereof. The order for an adjourned term shall be signed by a majority of the judges thereof at a regular term of said court and entered upon the minutes of the court, and any business which the court might do at any regular term thereof may be done at such adjourned term; and the clerk of said court shall be entitled such mileage for attendance at such abjourned term as is by law allowed the marshal of the district of Arizona for his aftendance upon the courts in said Territory.

That in alicentested election cases the time allowed for taking testimony shall be minety days, and the testimony shall be taken in the following order; The contestant shall take testimony during the first forty days; the returned member during the succeeding forty days; and the contestant may take testimony in rebuttal only during the remaining ten days of said period. Such testimony in rebuttal may be taken on five days notice. Testimony may be taken and two or more places at the same time. Sec. 2. Depositions of wilnesses residing outside of the district and beyond the reach of a subyean may be taken before any officer authorized by law to take testimony m contested election cases in the district in which the witness to be examined may reside.

Sec. 3. That the party desiring to take a deposition or depositions of this act, or of the act to which this is an amendment, shall give the opposite party notice, in writing, of the time and piace, when and where, the same will be taken, as well as of the name of the witness or witnesses to be examined, and of the name of an officer before whom the same will be taken. The notice shall be personally served upon the opposite party, or upon any agent or attorney or his authorized by him to take testimony or cross-examine witnesses in the matter of such contest, if, by the use

testimony or cross-examine witnesses in the matter of such contest, if, by the use of reasonable diligence, such personal service can be made; but if, by the use of such diligence, personal service cannot be made, the service may be inade by leaving a duplicate of the notice at the usual place of abode of the opposite party. The notice shall be served so as to allow the opposite party sufficient time by the usual route of travel to attend, and one day for preparation, exclusive of Sundays and the day of service. And the taking of the testimony may, if so stated in the notice, be abjourned from day to day. The notice, with the proof or acknowledgment of the service thereof, shall be attached to the depositions when completed. The party notified as aforesaid, his agent or atterney, may, if he see fit, select an officer (having authority to take depositions in such cases) to officiate, with the officer named in the notice, in the taking of the depositions; and if both such officers attend, the depositions shall be taken before them both, sitting together, and be certified by them both. Sec. 2. That whosoever shall violate any provision of this act shall be stricken from the roll of attorneys by the court upon complaint, upon which the rescondent shall have due notice, and be heard in his defence; and in the case of a marshal or demyt marshal so acting, he shall be recommended by the court for dismissal from office.

Sec. 2. That the members of each branch of said legislatures shall receive a compensation of six dollars per day during the sessions herein provided for, and they shall receive and the speaker of the house of representatives shall each receive a compensation of ten dollars per day, and that the additional officers of each branch of said legislatures seemblies shall consist of one chief clerk, who shall receive a compensation of eight dollars per day, and of one assistant clerk, one enrolling clerk, one engrossing clerk, one sergeant-at-arms, one door-keeper, one messencer, and one watchman, who shall each receive a compensation of five dollars per day, and the sessions.

Sec. 3. That from and after the first day of July, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, the annual salaries of the gover-

ing the sessions.

That from and after the first day of July, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, the annual salaries of the governors of the several Territories of the United States shall be three thousand five hundred dollars, and the salaries of the secretaries of said Territories shall be two thousand five hundred dollars each.
