WEATHER RECORD FOR APRIL.—Mean temperature for the month, 51 degrees. Highest temperature on the 16th, 61; lowest on the 3d, 33. Highest temperature during the month on the 16th, 73; lowest on the 14th, 32. Clear days 14, cloudy 8, showery 8. Wind north 12 days, northwest 2, southwest 16. On the 3d, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 9th, 10th, 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 24th and 25th, frost. The corresponding month last year had but three frosty mornings.

Latest News.

Only three of the crew of the ship Tenyson, which foundered at sea on February 21th, were saved, including William Noyes, second mate. They floated eight days on a piece of wreck.

Geo. Francis Train, having been declared sane, is to be prosecuted by the District Attorney for publishing an obscene paper, in connection with the Woodhull & Claflin matter.

The widow of the late Gen. Wool, aged 85, died on the 7th inst., in New York.

On the 7th, Oakes Ames had not improved any, but instead was growing weaker.

Chief Justice Chase died in Washington, on the 7th inst., of apoplexy. He was attacked on the 6th. The flags on the City Hall, Custom House and other public buildings were at half mast on the 7th, at New York, out of respect to his memory.

Judge Bingham, of Ohio, will, it is believed, receive the St. Petersburg Mission, made vacant by the death of Hon. Jas. L. Orr.

A Commission will be sent to negotiate with the Sioux and other Indians on the reservation in Southwestern Dakota for a modification of the treaty of 1853, so as to withdraw from the Indians the privilege of hunting outside the reservation. The Commission will consist of three or four persons, and the Board of Indian Commissioners will probably name the chairman.

The Oregonian learns that Mrs. Canby has presented the Portland Library Association with the entire military library of her husband, the late Gen. Canby, as a token of his esteem for the citizens of that city.

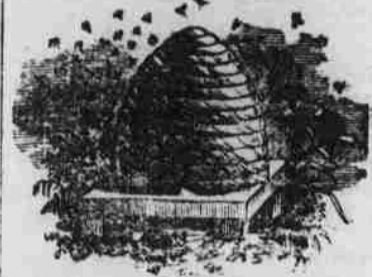
