# Laws of the United States.

PASSED AT THE THIRD SESSION OF THE FORTY-SECOND CONGRESS.

### (General Nature-No. 58.)

AN ACT making appropriations for the naval service for the year ending June thirtleth, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, and for other purposes.

ty-four, and for other purposes. Be it enacted by the S-note and House of Representatives of the United States of Amer-ica in Congress assembled. That the fol-lowing sums be, and they are hereby, ap-propriated, to be raid out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropri-ated, for the naval service of the govern-ment for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, and for other purposes: for other purposes:

eighteen hundreil and seventy-four, and for other purposes: For pay of commissioned and warrant officers at sea, including sea-ruy and me-tions of officers detailed or appointed as naval storekeepers abroad, on shore, on special service, and of those on the retired list and uneuroloved, and for mileare and transportation of officers travelling under orders, and for pay of the perty-officers, seamen, ordinary seamen, hardsmen, and boys, including men of the engineer's force, and for the Coast-Survey service, eight thousand dive hundred men, at an average pay of three hundred dollars each per annum, six million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars: *Provided*. That no officer on the retired list of the mavy shall be employed in active duty except in time of war: *And provid d*. That those officers on the retired list, and those hereafter re-tired, who were, or who may be, retired after forty years' service, or on attaining the age of sixty-two years, in contourly with section one of the act of becomber, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, and its amendments, dated June twenty-fifth, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, or those who were or may be retired from incapae-itry exsiting from long and failbful ser-ylee, from womds or injuries received in who were or may be retired from incarac-ity resulting from long and faiblful ser-vice, from wounds or injuries received in the line of duty, from sickness or extos-ure therein, shall, after the passage of this act, be entitled to seventy-five ner centum of the present searchy of the grade or mark which they held at the time of their re-tirement.
