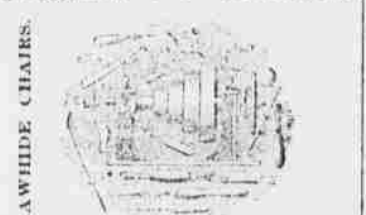

PACIFIC COAST NEWS.

Jackson county promises a good sulphur and several soda springs.

A rattlesnake with 15 rattles was killed the other day near Heard's Mills, Jackson county.

The *Bulletin* says the hoodlum element is increasing in that city rapidly.

The *Bulletin* says that a little daughter of Meacham is selling photographs of scenes in the lava beds, around town; that she disposed of eleven dozen in one day.

A Chinese woman suicided in San Francisco on the 26th, by taking opium. A young man, known as Gus, of the same city, also took his own life by hanging.

Peef cattle from Ochoo have been selling in the Salem market for four cents a pound.

Baker county Democrats will hold a county convention August 6th.

Mr. J. W. Kelly, late of the Salem *Mercury*, is to take editorial charge of the *Plainsdealer* of Roseburg.

A kick of a Canyonville mule dislocated the shoulder and broke the arm of Mr. Cotton of that place.

A number of visitors are at present camping at Newport, on Yaquina, enjoying the "salt, salt, sea."

The stockholders of the Corvallis Warehouse Company met at the Court House in Corvallis on last Saturday, the 19th inst., and increased the capital stock from \$3,000 to \$7,000 by unanimous vote, the old stock having all been taken.

The road from Pioneer to Newport, Yaquina, is in fair condition, but parties traveling it should not attempt to ford Depot slough with vehicles, as the banks are miry and impassable.

Miners are scarce at Silver City.

Mr. Longfellow, residing near the head of Soap Creek, Benton county, killed a large black bear, one day last week, with a shot gun loaded with bird shot. Bruin was making off with a lamb, when Mr. L. ran and fired two shots square in the bear's face, two of the shot penetrating the brain through the eyes.

Rev. A. L. Lindsley, D. D., of Portland, will organize a Presbyterian Church in Roseburg on the 3d of August next, between the hours of 10 and 11 A. M.

Two prominent merchants of Silver City, Idaho, have challenged each other to mortal combat, and citizens are looking to see waters of Jordan creek reddened with human gore soon.

A large number of men in Corvallis have decided that the "leather Chinese" shall vacate the premises, and with this end in view, have notified them to leave the tenements occupied by them soon, or they will be driven from town.

The *Bulletin* says: James R. Parish, the editor of the *Commercial Reporter*, was arraigned in the Police Court last Saturday on the charge of forgery, the complaint being preferred by Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Rybee. The defendant waived an examination and was bound over in the sum of \$250 to await the action of the Grand Jury.

From the *Statesman* we learn that on last Sunday night the residence of Mr. Jos. Hoyt, of Salem, was entered by burglars, and property consisting of blankets and watch taken which were valued at \$260.

A Newton, Cal., man was seized with emotional insanity when he saw a fence advertiser painting the name of a quack medicine on the front gate. The advertiser packed off his pot and brushes and half an ounce of small shot.

The Agricultural Works at Salem cost \$30,000.

An individual was arrested in Portland the other day for watching the sleeping apartments of several houses while inmates were retiring. After a severe reprimand he was discharged.

Crowds of surveyors are now at work laying off the townsite of Tacoma.

The Rocky Mountain Conference of the M. E. Church has been in session at Salt Lake this week.

Baker city feels large over the possession of an entire block of stone buildings.

Work on the Walla Walla and Wallula narrow-gauge railroad is progressing rapidly.

Jacksonville had \$34 left of the fund raised to celebrate the Fourth of July, after all expenses were paid.

John Neuber, of Jacksonville has returned home in good health from the East Portland Insane Asylum where he has been under treatment.

The contract for building a jail in Tillamook county will be let soon. The need is becoming more urgent as population increases.

Wells, Fargo & Co. offer a reward of \$500 each for the arrest of the Port Neuf Canyon road agents.

Gen. Jeff. C. Davis was tendered a reception as he passed through Walla Walla last week.

At the time the freight train left Corvallis, one night not long ago, a bus-body in camped the emigrant cars, and they were left on the track until the conductor missed them, after going five miles westward.

The Walla Walla valley surplus of wheat will be at least 500,000 bushels, say good judges in that section.

Ann Eliza Webb, seventeenth wife of Brigham Young, has entered suit in the Third District Court of Utah, for \$200,000 damages and alimony, and pending suit \$1,000 per month; and \$20,000 counsel fees. The case will be tried before Judge Emerson about the 5th of August, on preliminary points. Other suits of a like nature will be begun soon.

The steamer Japan arrived in Frisco on the 28th, bringing about 1,200 Chinese passengers.

Robert Butler, formerly of this State, was sent to the Insane Asylum from San Francisco on the 28th. He is impressed with the belief that swarms of insects are holding anti-Chinese meetings in his stomach, and that enemies are constantly pursuing him.

A party of four young men of Portland start for Mount Hood next Monday.

The Oregon City Enterprise says: "Steps have been taken to secure a subscription among printers to erect a neat little monument to the honor of the late John Fleming, who died at that place about a year ago."

Madame Anna Bishop is expected to arrive at Portland by the next steamer.

The *Bulletin* says, Corbett & Macleay made their first shipment of Oregon salmon to Europe four years ago in the ship *Adeline Edwards*, and now they are shipping it to all the Australian Colonies, China, Liverpool and the West Indies, and in each place the fish possesses an excellent reputation.

Rev. Dr. Atkinson of Portland, is going to Tacoma to open a lodging and reading tent, to keep men away from the saloons.

The Pentagram has been designated by the Executive Committee of the Grand Lodge of Good Templars, as the organ of the order in Oregon.

The Summerville and Walla road is rapidly approaching completion. It will be opened between the 1st and 15th of September.

The Union County Agricultural Society has purchased ninety acres of land for a place whereon to hold their county fairs.

Miles M. Miller is again doing the "locals" on the Salem *Statesman*.

The office of Marshal in the town of La Grande is going begging.

Green and ripe pears and blossoms were all seen on the same tree at La Grande last week.

The Pendleton Sunday School is soon to be furnished with a new library from a firm in Portland.

The Pendleton custom is for young men to furnish their own lights when they go courting.

The two cavalry companies on the way from Arizona to garrison Fort Walla Walla arrived at La Grande on Thursday last.

Colonel Peter Saxe has sold two of his fine Durlams. One—"Noble Fifth"—was sold to Eliza McDonald, of Polk county, for \$2,000, and the other—"Ned Ingalls"—was sold to Mr. Comstock, of Salem, for \$800.

There have been twenty-nine marriage licenses issued in Umatilla county during the past year, but only twenty-eight marriages have taken place. Owing to some misunderstanding, one couple did not come to time.

All of the Wallowa valley, lying north of the south line of Township 1, south of the base line to the Minum river, thence down said river to the mouth of Grand Ronde river, thence up Snake river to the line above described, has been set apart as a reservation for the Nez Perce Indians, as recommended by the Secretary of the Interior and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

New wheat in small lots has been offered in the Walla Walla market.

Cattle buyers from Montana are making purchases in Walla Walla Valley.

The *Statesman* has this relative to Mrs. Joaquin Miller: It will be remembered that some time ago, this lady went East on a lecturing tour. For a little time we heard of her success as a lecturer, but for some time the press has been silent concerning her whereabouts. From the Chicago Evening Times of a late date we learn that Mrs. Miller was to have sailed from New York City on the 10th (where she has been for the past six months) for Oregon, by way of the Isthmus. She will then return to New York with her children, to embark in literary pursuits at that city, having received substantial encouragement from responsible sources. At no very distant day she designs to issue a volume of poems.

Henry Burke came near losing his life at Clatsop, the other day, by venturing out while bathing two far. He struggled a long time before he got back to the beach, and then was nearly exhausted.

Among the passengers noted as en route for Oregon, are Gov. Woods, of Utah, and W. L. Halsey, of Portland, Vice President of the Oregon & California Railroad Company.

All readers of Macaulay's History will remember his account of the visit of the Czar Peter and his Russian attendants to England in the reign of William the Third. These nobles were attired in garments of the most costly material, fairly ablaze with jewels and diamonds. At the same time they were filthy beyond expression, and vermin dropped from garments bedecked with a gorgeous profusion of barbaric pearl and gold.
