RELIGIOUS.—Rev. Dr. E. R. Geary will preach in the Pacific Opera House on Sunday next, morning and evening. All are invited.

COUNTY CONVENTION.—The Republican County Convention will meet to-morrow (Saturday, August 30th) at one o'clock P. M., in the Pacific Opera House. The business of the Convention will be to elect eight delegates to attend the State Convention, which meets in this city on the 11th of September—one week from next Thursday.

THE WEATHER.—Which had been cloudy with occasional showers, the forepart of the week, cleared up on Thursday, and harvesting, which had been suspended, was again resumed. Farmers and business men have dropped their long faces and once more wear the seven-by-nine smile.

CIRCUS.—The Parisian Circus, which exhibited in this city on Monday night, was well attended, and gave general satisfaction. The balloon ascension in the evening was a perfect success. The balloon mounted up toward the clouds for a few hundred yards, and then grandly floated off a mile or two northeast, descending on the opposite side of the Willamette.

ACCIDENTS.—The season for accidents is upon us. Five or six days since, a son of Rev. Mr. Nickerson, of Lebanon, slipped from a wagon, or stack of grain, and fell on the tumbling-rod of a threshing machine, causing the bursting of a blood vessel.

Halleck Griffen, oldest son of Dr. Griffen, of this city, in some manner got caught—or at least the seat of his pants caught—by the tumbling-rod of a threshing machine, tearing a hole in the pants big enough to drive a four-horse wagon through. A narrow escape.

A few days since a little son of Mrs. Bodine was kicked by a horse, the animal's hoof striking him in the month, cutting a long deep gash in the upper lip. Dr. Rice sewed the lip together, and, bearing the scar, the little fellow is all right again.

TOO LATE.—The apportionment of school funds for Linn county for the six months ending September 1st, 1873, has been made, by districts, and handed us for publication, but was received too late for this issue. The whole amount apportioned is \$4,835.09 of which \$2,773.90 is coin, and \$2,061.19 currency. The amount per scholar is \$1.10; per cent of currency, 43c. Clerks are requested to call at the Co. Latest News.

A fire at Eaton, Ohio, on the 24th, destroyed one of the principal blocks.

Judge Thomas A. R. Nelson, Judge of the Supreme Court, died at Knoxville, Tenn., on the 24th, of cholera, after an illness of two days.

It has been officially announced that the Modoc captives—Captain Jack, Sconchin, Black Jim, Boston Charley, One-eyed Jim and Cox—will be hanged October 3d, for the murder of Gen. Canby and Peace Commissioner Thomas. The Military Commission found them guilty of the charges and specifications against them and sentenced them to be hanged. The President approved the finding and named the time. The Secretary of War has ordered that the sentences be duly executed under the General commanding the Department of the Columbia at Fort Klamath.

A destructive fire occurred at Belfast, Maine, on the 24th, burning over 125 buildings, mostly wood. The whole loss is put at \$500,000. The steamer George C. Wolfe is reported to have blown up at St. Francis Island in the Mississippi river on the 22d. Twelve persons are known to be lost and fifteen wounded.

A conflagration at Millin, Pa., on the 23d, consumed one entire block and part of another. Loss, \$100,000.

It is officially denied at Washington that either the Peace Commissioners or the Interior Department furnished the Sioux with breech loaders or any other weapons. They say they must have been furnished by traders.

The Secretary of the Treasury has directed that interest due September 1st, amounting to about \$5,000,000, be paid on and after August 25th, without rebate.

Of the medals of merit at Vienna for mowers and reapers two were awarded to the Buckeys and to McCormick's.

It is said the high price of English iron and the increased production in this country have rendered the American market almost independent of Great Britain.

As Walter Gibson, local editor of a Harlem, N. Y., paper, was retiring from his office on the evening of the 23d, some unknown person flung a cup of vitriol or muriatic acid in his face, probably destroying the sight of one if not both of his eyes. The perpetrator sprang into a buggy, in charge of a confederate bear, and disappeared. Revenge for personal attacks is supposed to have prompted the act.

Miss Levy, of Belmont, N. Y., aged 60, died on Thursday of last week of voluntary starvation, having refused food for twenty-eight days. A sister of the deceased died in the same way a few years ago.

A special to the New York Times, of Washington, August 21st, says: The Secretary of the Treasury authorizes your correspondent explicitly to deny all published statements regarding an alleged deficit in the Treasury. There is and has been no deficit of a dollar or a cent. The Secretary has no statement to make other than the official monthly statements of the condition of the public finances.

The Bureau of Education has information that Chicago and Cincinnati have each received from the Vienna Exposition, the Grand Medal of Progress for their system of education, teaching and instructing, and Cleveland and Jacksonville, Ill., were awarded Diplomas of Merit in the same department. In the one department of education, teaching and instruction, twenty-five prizes were awarded to the United States.

The Central Pacific gold bonds have fallen below par in currency in the New York market.

An express train was approaching Batavia, N. Y., on the 25th, it ran into a carriage, killing both occupants. One of the men was thrown a number of yards into a field, and the other dragged along till the train stopped, his body being horribly mutilated. The engineer on stopping the train, got off the engine to see what injury had been done. In passing the front of the locomotive he saw it covered with blood and brains, which so overcame him, that he walked but a few steps and fell. He was carried into the smoking car where he died in a few minutes.

A ma-house and ice-house burned at Milwaukee on the 25th. Loss, \$20,000; insurance, \$15,000.

A fire in Linn, Mass., on the 25th, occasioned a loss of \$1,000,000.

On last Sunday there was a severe engagement near Estelle, Spain, between 5,000 Government troops and 23,000 Carlists under Olla. The latter defeated and the leader wounded.

Sir Samuel Baker and party have reached Cairo returning from their expedition into Africa.

It is rumored in Paris that the proposed fusion between the Orleanists and Legitimists has been abruptly ended, owing to the Count De Chambord refusing to accept the tricolor.

Wm. Monsel, Postmaster General of England, has tendered his resignation, but at the solicitation of Gladstone, he consents to remain temporarily in charge of the department.
