PACIFIC COAST NEWS.

Wm. Cree, an old resident of Portland, aged 43, died on Friday night last. Deceased came to Portland in 1853, was a native of Ireland, and left a large property.

At Coos Bay, on the 27th ult., Robt. Hall, aged 36, and Henry Hall, aged 15, brothers, were killed by the caving in of the coal mine in which they were at work.

The taxable property of Polk county exceeds \$1,600,000.

Delegates to the Republican State Convention from Benton are: A. M. Witham, Samuel Case, W. B. Carter, J. Brownson and Sol. King.

The taxable property of Jackson county is \$1,726,116.

Grant county Republican Convention instructs for Hon. B. Whitten.

Hon. J. R. McLain had his right leg broken above the knee, one day last week. His foot caught in the coil of a lariat attached to a running horse, when he was dragged some twenty-five yards.

Wasco county has 24,500 head of cattle; 4,799 horses, 13,000 sheep, 730 swine. There are 900 taxpayers; last year there were but 538.

A young man in Roseburg attempted to get away with the old man's daughter; the old man smelt a mice; caught the eloping pair, and there and then administered such a thrashing to the boy as he will remember for a period.

The wheat crop in Douglas reported extra. Price per bushel, sacks furnished, 75c. 100,000 bushels had already been sold.

J. J. Comstock and Ben Holladay have formed a partnership, and will proceed at once to open a coal mine, owned by the former on Pass Creek. Its proximity to the railroad will enable the Company to furnish it at a price defying competition.

The election in San Francisco is mixed. It is conceded that the Booth ticket got away with Frisco.

Latest News.

The Oregon Central Railroad reduced its freights from Cornelius to Portland, which took effect August 25th. Flour, grain and mill stuffs per car load is reduced to 12 1/2 cents per 100 pounds; merchandise, 20 cents per 100 pounds; horses, cattle and hogs, per car, \$16; sheep, per car, \$14.

The Annual Convocation of the Protestant Episcopal Missionary Diocese of Oregon and Washington Territory, met in Trinity church, Portland, on Thursday evening of last week. Thirteen ministers were present. Bishop Morris delivered his annual address to a large congregation.

The Klamath Indians are very indignant at the liberties allowed Scar-faced Charley and the scouts who deserted Jack and helped General Davis, declaring that if Capt. Jack and the others convicted are hung, Scar-face and the scouts shall never leave the country alive.

The soldiers at Fort Klamath swear vengeance against Scar-face and Bogus Charley, because they caught, and brought back a couple of deserters whom they were sent after.

On the 28th ult., Captain Hasbroek, with a detachment of 15 men, had gone to the scene of the massacre of Captain Thomas, command in the lava-bed on the 27th of last May, for the purpose of bringing the remains of Lieut. Cranston and others to Fort Klamath.

Immense gold deposits are reported to have been discovered in British Columbia, at the head waters of the Stickeen river, 240 miles back from the coast line.

Rev. Stephen Bowers, of the Salem pastorate, has received 160 persons into the Methodist Church at that place within the past year.

Mrs. Celia A. Blake, the first person born in Jefferson county, W. T., died at Port Townsend on the 17th inst.

For the lack of water and gold, the Ochoco mines have *ous-ga spiel*.

On the 19th ult., the sheriff of Whatcom county lost his house, barn (full of hay) orchard, fences and farm improvements by fire.

The City Council of Seattle have decided to the Seattle and Walla Walla Railroad and Transportation Company all the tide flats south of King street, in that city, on Elliott's Bay.

The road from Lebanon up the Santiam and over the Cascades is in fine order. The boulders in the five crossings of that river are thrown out, and crossing is now good.

A new station, to be called Newtown, is to be established two miles east of Hillsboro.

The number of resident tax-payers in Washington county is 1,098; non-resident, 243; poll tax-payers, 768.

Much sickness is reported in Washington county.

John T. Bird, member of Congress from New Jersey, on the 27th ult., returned his back-pay to the U. S. Treasury, including interest on a portion of the amount, which had accrued by investment.

Losses by the recent flood in the Delaware are put down at \$670,000, of which \$500,000 may probably fall upon the Delaware and Chesapeake Canal, \$100,000 on vessels and barges stranded on the Meadows, and \$50,000 on the Delaware Railroad.

Six dwellings were destroyed by fire at Edgefield, Tenn., on the 27th.

A dispatch from Westminster, Md., August 27th, says that Wm. A. Mathias, aged 22 years, died, as was supposed, Sunday evening of brain fever, and the body was placed on ice. Yesterday, when the family had assembled for the funeral services, it was noticed that the skin had assumed a natural appearance, and examination showed that life was not extinct. Physicians were called and Mathias is recovering.

A fire at Gloucester, Mass., on the night of the 27th ult., destroyed five blocks. Loss, \$75,000.

At Lancaster, N. Y., Henry Ward Beecher delivered the closing address of the Woman's Suffrage Convention, in the open air, to 2,000 persons.

Wm. R. Boyce, President of the First National Bank of Lynn, Mass., committed suicide, August 27th.

J. H. Rosanquest, Cashier of the First National Gold Bank, Tarrytown, N. Y., committed suicide the other day.

The dairies about St. Louis are troubled with the Spanish fever. Twenty-five cows died within two days last week.

W. W. Anderson, of Montana Territory, has been appointed agent for the Indians of Milk River Agency.

Hon. Joseph Farewell, Mayor of Rockland, Me., Isaac M. Bragg, Esq., Bangor, and Messrs. Pope Bros, Machias, Me., lumber merchants, fully endorsed the Sheridan Cavalry Condition Powder, and have given the proprietors liberty to use their names in recommending them.

The latest telegrams give Washburne 100 clear majority over Butler in the Convention.

Yellow fever is reported in Galveston, Houston and Shreveport, Texas, and that a perfect panic prevails, the inhabitants fleeing in every direction.

Five men, sent from Madrid, Spain, to assassinate Don Carlos, were caught and executed at Estrella.

On the 6th a square of buildings in Havana, known as the Plaza, were burned, and twenty lives lost.

On the night of the 5th, the Phoenix planing-mill, Chicago, was destroyed by fire. Loss \$300,000, partially insured.

Morris Puepfl was arrested in Philadelphia on the 5th, charged with firing the Fashion Stables at Trenton.

Peace Commissioner Dyer says our soldiers killed but four Modocs, while the Modocs killed two soldiers for each Modoc engaged in the war.

Late news from Monterey give rumors of renewed hostilities in Mexico.

The Pope is again indisposed.
