**COURT BUSINESS.**—George Blakely, charged with assault, was convicted and fined \$25 and costs. Joseph Blakely, assault and battery; found guilty and fined \$25 and costs. Wm. H. Brown, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, (for assaulting City Marshal); gave bonds in \$500—M. V. Brown and J. R. Heren, sureties. Peter Bilyen, assault with dangerous weapon. Wm. Moore, selling liquors without license. In the indictments found in the case of the State of Oregon vs. Peterson, for assault with a dangerous weapon, the Grand Jury returned "not a true bill." The same in the case of Finn, charged with the same offense.

**THE VOTE OF LINN COUNTY.**—Below we give the reported majorities in the different precincts in this county. For Nesmith: Albany, 135; Syracuse, 24; Scio, 74; Franklin Butte, 71; Santiam, 23; Sweet Home, 10; Lebanon, 53; Brownsville, 76; Brush Creek, 6; Harrisburg, 7; Halsey, 29; Center 3—total, 506. For Hiram Smith: Waterloo, 4; Orleans, 4—total 8. This is really a bigger vote than there was any necessary for!

**VIEWS.**—Mr. J. G. Crawford, of Harrisburg, has just returned home from a tour in the mountains and along the coast for some weeks. During his absence he secured a large number of stereoscopic views of prominent points in Oregon. **RACES.**—At the State Fair Ground, on the 15th, there were two races, the first a single dash of half a mile, for purse of \$150—won by Confidence, entered by J. F. Bybee, in 54 seconds. Second race was a mile and a half dash, for purse of \$50—won by Birmingham, entered by J. F. Bybee, in 2:57 1/4.
