EQUALIZATION.—The State Board of Equalization have made considerable changes in the assessments of this county.

Added twenty-five per cent. to the assessment of agricultural lands, making \$2,873,327 50, an increase of \$547,472 50.

Adds seventeen per cent. to the assessment of horses, making \$317,490, an increase of \$195,180.

Adds forty-six per cent. to the assessment of cattle, making \$223,651, an increase of \$70,453.

Adds twenty-six per cent. to the assessment of sheep, making \$102,403, an increase of \$21,131.

Adds one hundred and ninety-two per cent. to the assessment of swine, making \$13,893, an increase of \$4,653.

It adds thirty-three and one third per cent. to the assessment of the Western Union Telegraph Company's property, making it \$3,400.

It adds one hundred per cent. to the assessment of the European and Oregon Land Company's property, making it \$27,703 50.

It adds sixty-six and two-thirds per cent. to the assessment of the Williamette Valley and Cascade Mountain Wagon Road Company's property, making it \$197,332 04.

It deducts \$6,667 93 from the assessment of the Oregon and California Railroad Company's property, making it \$197,332 04.

The above amounts are taken from the return made by the Board of Equalization to the County Clerk of this county. The Board have made one or two mistakes which will be very perplexing to the county officers.

Appropriations for city expenses of New York for 1874, approved October 31th, by the Board of Estimate Apportioners, foot up \$25,500,000, an increase over last year of \$1,800,000.

Mr. J. H. D. Henderson who was Representative in Congress from Oregon when the increased and back pay bill of 1833 was passed, has published a card denying the allegation by Col. Nesmith that he (Henderson) voted for the bill.

At New York on the 3d inst, the Pacific Mail Company received a dispatch announcing the complete wreck of the steamer Ariel between Yokohama and Hakodadi.

It is rumored that Prince Bismark will summon Catholic Bishops of Germany who refuse to comply with the Government measures toward ecclesiastics, and demand their resignations.

Large numbers of employes in Eastern States continue to be thrown out of employment every day in consequence of the recent money panic.

Thos. F. Beall, of Jackson county, the past season raised 57 1/2 bushels of wheat on eight acres of land, being 7 1/2 bushels to the acre.
