**THREE LINKS.**—Quite a number of the members of the Lodge of I. O. O. F. at Lebanon, visited Albany Lodge No. 4 on Wednesday evening. It was a most interesting occasion to all.

**ON TUESDAY.**—In the Circuit Court for Multnomah county, Charles Mealey was granted a change of venue to Linn county—his name. The trial will probably not come off until next March.

**CONCERT.**—A Sunday School Concert will be held in the M. E. Church on Sunday (to-morrow), November 23d, at 2½ P. M. An interesting programme has been arranged, consisting of declamations, and singing by the children. All are cordially invited to attend on the occasion.

**JUDGES OF ELECTION.**—On Tuesday evening the City Council appointed Messrs. Walter Ketchum, David Thompson and George Patterson to serve as Judges of Election at the polls on Monday, December 1st, 1873. The County Treasurer's office, in the Court House, was selected as the place in which to hold the said election.

**HONORABLY ACQUITTED.**—On Wednesday, Sheriff Scott, of Marion county, arrested Mr. R. S. Owen, of this county, on charge of burglary, preferred by a citizen of Marion county. Owen accompanied Scott to Salem, and on Wednesday evening had an examination before his honor, Jesse Johnson, of that city. The result of the examination was the complete vindication of the character of Mr. Owen, and his consequent discharge.

**FOOT CRUSHED.**—A young man named Mark Ward, brakeman on the O. & C. Railroad, on Thursday, while attempting to jump on a car when the train was in motion at the depot in this city, missed connection, and fell so that one wheel of a car passed over his foot. The boot in which said foot was encased was rudely torn and smashed to pieces, but, strange to say, the foot escaped serious injury, although pretty badly bruised. Such escapes incline one to believe in the old adage: It's better to be born lucky than rich. Later—We have learned, since writing the above, that the accident is more serious than at first supposed; that the foot was badly crushed, three bones being fractured. His physicians think the foot can be saved.

**ARRESTED.**—On Tuesday, at Portland, Sheriff Parker, of this county, arrested Harding Dawson, charged with incest upon his half-sister, a resident of this city. Sheriff Parker, accompanied by his prisoner, arrived in this city on Wednesday. On Thursday Dawson was brought before Justice Carothers for a preliminary examination. The complaining witness, Mrs. Backus, testified that A. H. Dawson had had partial connection, by force, with her, about ten months since. Dr. Jones testified that pregnancy might be accomplished by partial connection; that it had been accomplished by artificial means. Dawson was held to bail in the sum of \$1,000 to answer at the next term of the Linn County Circuit Court for the crime of incest.

**BADLY BURNED.**—The wife of Albert Bond, who resides near Scio, was terribly burned, some days since, under the following circumstances: Feeling unwell she lay down before the fire and went to sleep, and while in this position her clothing was ignited by falling coals, and before she could extricate herself from them, were burned completely from her body, burning even her under garments. The Salem Mercury says that although her life was at first despaired of, she is now in a fair way of recovery.

**BENTON COUNTY'S SHERIFF.**—Came down to this city on Thursday and arrested Wm. Brown, ex-City Watchman, charged with arresting, some two months since, a party in Benton county and bringing him to this city without the proper authority in such cases provided.
