LOCAL MATTERS.

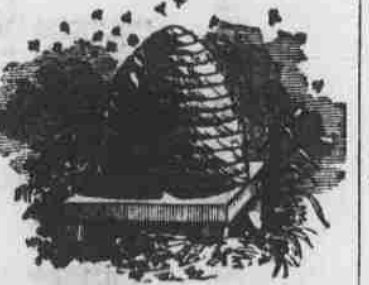
