WIMAWHALA ENCAMPMENT NO. 6.—Was instituted at Eugene City, on Monday night last, by Special Deputy Grand Sire, A. Noltner, assisted by A. L. Stinson, G. W.; A. C. Bailey, G. H. P.; Henry H. Gilfray, G. S., and J. M. Bacon, G. T. The charter members are: E. L. Bristow, J. J. Walton, Jr., Wm. Killingsworth, Wm. J. Shipley, Frank S. Singer, Geo. W. Kinsey, Ben. F. Dorris, N. L. Lee and A. G. Hovey. After institution, the Encampment elected the following patriarchs as officers for the current term: E. L. Bristow, C. P.; B. F. Dorris, H. P.; J. J. Walton, Jr., S. W.; Wm. J. Shipley, Scribe; F. J. Singer, Treasurer; Wm. Killingsworth, J. W. Fifteen members were then added to the Camp, one by card and fourteen by initiation—a splendid night's work, probably never equalled in the State. A large number of visitors were present, some fifteen from this city, ten or more from Oregon City, and a number from Salem, Corvallis, and other points. The wound was inflicted with a large butcher knife, on the left side of the neck, just inside the collar bone, causing death in a few minutes.

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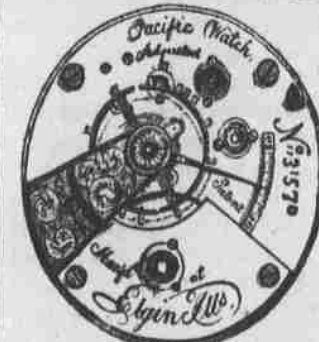
