CURRENT NEWS.

The Modoc war claims are being audited, and ordered paid. Seventy three thousand dollars was ordered to be paid on the 4th, in San Francisco, for transportation and supplies.

The American Iron and Steel Association met in Philadelphia on the 4th and expressed their views to the effect that the ten per cent. duty on iron should be repealed. About one-half of the rail mills and foundries are fdle. 12.000 hands are unemployed.

Tweeds Lawyers are endeavoring to press upon Judge Davis a bill of ex-ceptions, to be argued at the next general term.

Several merchants of Brooklyn. New York, are under heavy bonds for alledged trauds upon the Revenue

The Pacific Mail Company will soon commence calling at Kingston, Jamaica, on their regular trips.

The Seventh annual session of the

National Grange of Patrons of Hus-bandry met in St. Louis on the 4th. Thirty two States and two Territories were represented by their Masters. The meeting is in secret session.

The annual Convention of the Na itonal Reform Association was held in Pittsburg on the 4th. The object of the Association is to secure the recognition of God, in the Constitution. Delegates were present from most of the States, and of every shade of religious views.

James B. Groom has been elected Governor of Maryland, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the election of Governor Pinkney to the United States Senate.

London Dispatches of the 5th say: Returns from 16 constituancies where elections were held yesterday show 19 Conservatives and 10 Liberals elected or returned unopposed to Parliament.

Mr Disraeli spoke at Newport yes-terday. He said that Gladstone and the Irish policy had atterly fulled. In-stead of producing tranquility in Ireland, that country was now in a more disturbed state and more stringently governed than ever before. He also said that but for the University at London, Mr. Lowe (late Chancllor of the Exchequer) would now be without a seat, his unpopularity being such that his appearance on the hustings would endanger his life. Throughout the whole of Disraeli's speech a mob pelted with stones the windows of the hall in which the meeting was held, and attempted to break up the meeting. A free fight ensued.

The pollings at Hackney has been declared void because of informalities. At Staleybridge, Lancashire, serious riots occurred, and many persons were injured. At Dudley. Recent elections to the Prassian Parliament have demonstrated the extreme improbability of Bismarck's success by noted viegal or parliamentary means. The Catholics have gained 35 votes in the Landing over and above what they had, and the Liberals have gained considerably. Edwin Booth, the acter, has bank-Captain General Jovellar has Issued a proclamation declaring the Island or Cuba in a state of siege. Rebels, and those accused of sedition, will be tried by Court Martial. One person out of every ten will be drafted for active service, for six months. No able bodied males exempt between the ages of 20 and 45 years. Not one subject to draft will be permitted to leave the Island, unless he gives bonds that he will furnish a substitute in case he is drafted. All persons over 45 years of will have to furnish for mobilization one man out of every ten. Quartermasters will furnish necessary accontrements to drafted persons, who will receive the same treatment and be subject to the same laws and regulations as regular soldiers. Those drafted will be organized into bodies of 300, forming two additional companies to augment each battalion. Two-thirds of those drafted will remain in garrison, and the others take the field, accompanied by regulars every six months; one-third in the field will be relieved by the one or other two-thirds performing garrison duty. Artillery and engineer corps will be reinforced in the smae manner as infantry. Every male person of age shall be included in the militia. all to be liable to military duty under certain restrictions and conditions. Free colored people, enrolling in the militia, shall be subject to the same conditions as the whites, and be mobilized in the same manner. Owners of slaves shall give one out of every 1,000 in the Island to work in swamps. fortifications, and in trenches. At the end of the campaign the Government will liberate all those slaves,
