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A CASE OF DESERTION.—A few weeks ago, rather a handsome and genteel appearing young woman, claiming to be the unmarried daughter of a widow lady residing in Portland, sought and obtained employment as a seamstress in several families of this city. She said that she was suffering with a "spinal complaint," which unfitted her for doing hard labor. A week or more since she suddenly left this city, giving no one, so far as we can learn, any intimation of the cause for leaving or her point of destination. A few days ago we learned the further facts with regard to the fair seamstress: It seems she went from this city to the vicinity of Halsey, and applied to one of the householders thereabouts for shelter a few days, offering to pay liberally therefor. She said that a few months previously she had unfortunately for her, united in marriage with a man who proved to be a brute, whose treatment of her was so cruel that she was forced to leave him and find shelter where she might. Her story was believed, and she was furnished a home, where, a few hours after, she gave birth to a child. One day last week, after she had so far recovered as to be able to go about the house, she told the lady who had been so kind to her, that she was going out for a few moments and would soon return, requesting her in the mean time to look after the baby. Since that time the mother has failed to put in an appearance, although anxiously looked for by the afore-said kind and charitable lady, who now begins to doubt the story she told when seeking aid and comfort and the shelter of her roof. It is supposed that she took the cars at Halsey for Portland, where she may be sojourning at this time.

CATTLE POISONED.—Just across the river, on the bottoms, we learn that a number of cattle have died recently, supposed to have been poisoned by eating larkspur. Larkspur belongs to the genus Delphinium—a vegetable alkaloid; its taste is bitter and acrid; when heated it melts, but on cooling becomes hard and brittle like resin.

THE DEMOLISHED SOUTHERN CHURCHES.—A committee of the Virginia Conference of the M. E. Church appeared before the Senate Committee on Claims to-day, asking a compensation for the churches destroyed by Union troops during the war at Arlington, Dumfries, Falls Church Village, and Fairfax Court House. They claim compensation on the ground that the portions of their congregations who remained at home at these places, which were within the Union lines during the war, were constantly loyal to the Government of the United States. — Wash.
