OYSTER-PATTIES IN BATTER.-Make a batter with the yolk of one egg or more, according to the amount of oysters you intended to prepare, a little mtmeg, some beaten mace, a little flour and a little salt ; dip in the ovsters and fry them in lard to a nice light brown. If preferred, a little parsley may be shred very fine and mixed with the batter. The batter may also be made thicker and formed into the shape of a patty, or put into a small tin mold, the oysters being dropped in and cov-ered over, and the whole baked as a pudding would be .- Germantown Telegraph. 907

POTTING PLANIS,-A plant should not be potted when it is very dry, nor when soaked with wet. In the former case, it is very likely to remain dry, as the water will pass through the fresh soil without penetrating into the old ball of earth. When the roots are thickly interwoven, they should be carefully disengaged, that they may be spread out into the fresh soil; but in shifting young, healthy, growing plants, the roots which may be reaching the side of the pot, should not be disturbed, as it is important to preserve the smaller fibers, upon whose action the health

of the plant chiefly depends .- blor-

ist's Friend. To USE COLD POTATOES .- The boiled potatoes left after yesterday's dinner, are very good chopped fine and warmed for breakfast in good milk and butter, with salt and pepper. When you are boiling your teakettle at night, you can boil half a dozen good-sized potatoes, and when cold slice them the long way, something less than a quarter of an inch in thickness. In the morning lay them one by one on the griddle, to slowly toast or brown in good butter or fat, salting them carefully and evenly, after placing them in a covered dish. Men always like these with their coffee; and these, or the potato balls, are an addition to the tea. table when visitors are present. Still another way to fry is to pare the potato round and round, like an apple, until all is used, cooking slowly and evenly in a covered "spider," until brown. A correspondent of the English Mechanic says that he has used the following receipt with the greatest success for the cementing of iron railing tops, iron gratings to stoves, etc., and with such effect as 'to resist the blows of the sledge-hammer : Take equal parts of antphur and white lead with about a sixth of boyas ; meorporate the three ro as to form one homogeneous mass. When going to apply it, wet it with strong sulphuric acid and place a thin layer of it between the two pieces of iron, which should then be pressed together. I In five days it will be perfectly dry, all traces of the remini thering vanished, and the iron will have the appearance of having been welded together.




