### Scissorings.

THE NEW "INSECTICIDE."-Hot alum water is recent suggestion as an insecticide. It will distroy red and black ants, cockroaches, spiders chintzbugs, and all the erawling pests which infest our houses. Take two pounds of alum and dissolve it in three quarts of boiling water; let it stand on the fire until the alum disappears; then apply it with a brush, while nearly boiling hot, to every joint and crevice in your closet, pantry, bedsteads, shelves, and the like, Brush the crevices in the floor of the skirting, or mop boards it you suspect they lings look as if everybody was harbor vermin. If, in white wa ing a ceiling, plenty of alum is added to the lime, it will also serve to keep insects at a distance. Cockroaches will flee from paint which has been washed in cool alum water. Sugar barrels and boxes can be freed from ants by drawing a wide chalk mark just around the edge of the top of them. The mark mu-t be unbroken or they will creep over it, but a continuous chalk line half au inch in width will set their depredations at naught Powdered alum or borax will keep the chintz bug at a respectable distance, and travelers should always carry a package of it in their hand-bags, to scatter over and under their pillows in places where they have reason to suspect the presence of such bedfellows. - Germantown Telegraph.

John C. Fremont is in San Francisco. A few years ago his presence there would have been the signal for a series of receptions and ovations, but now be receives but a passing notice. The notoriety he had achieved and the position he had created for himself have all been swept away, and to-day the ex-plorer of the Rocky Mountains walks the streets of California's chief city comparatively unknown. When General Fremont was in France, he was arrested, tried, and found guilty of raising money on the Memphis and El Paso Railway bonds by fa'se representations, and centenced to imprisonment for a term of years. He made good his escape from the jurisdiction of the French courts, and came to the United States. His brother-in-law, Baron Balleau, who was tried under the same charge, was not as fortunate, and is now serving the term of imprisonment, Baron Boileau's wife, County, W. T., for a daughter of Thomas H. Benton, numbers \$1,450,000.
