At the recent election, Coleman Cole was elected Governor of the Choctaw Nation, and Frank Overton Governor of the Chickasaw Nation, Indian Territory.

The gold brought down to Walla Walla from the Columbia river lake country, is said to be very fine and pure. The possessor was very reticent about the gold prospects there.

The settlers of Wallowa valley have petitioned Gen. Davis to keep the troops now operating there, in the valley until the Indians leave, which is generally about the first of October, to prevent bloodshed between the Indians and whites, which it is feared will occur on withdrawal of the troops.

The District Court convened at Seattle, W. T., last week, Judge Jacobs presiding. Full docket reported.

One hundred and fifty head of California horses, belonging to the United States, were recently sold in Montana, in lots of ten, when they brought from \$10 to \$20 each.

In order to retain the services of a hired girl in Golden, Colorado, a horse and buggy must be kept for her in which to attend Grange meetings, and a piano for recreation.

The people of Jackson county are invited to meet at Ashland on the 9th of Sept., to consider the feasibility of the proposed road from Humboldt, Nevada, by way of the Rogue river valley to some point on the coast at or near Crescent City.

Among the countries Colorado should not be put down as the least. It is chronicled that a shower of white toads fell in Larimer county one day last week. The shower embraced a strip of country half a mile wide and several miles in length. After the shower the little things hopped about over the country in droves of ten thousand!

A company has been organized with a capital stock of \$50,000, whose avowed purpose is to place a line of steamers on the Columbia from Celilo to the head of navigation. This company will also construct a line of railway from Dayton to Walla Walla, and will also build railroad portages at the Dalles and Cascades.

A drove of ponies and colts from this State recently passed through Council Bluffs, Iowa, numbering 200, on their way to market. The average cost of the animals here was put down at \$30 each. The original outfit numbered 1,200, but disease and Siwashess—principally the latter—had reduced the original investment to 200. It wouldn't be a safe bet to put up coin that the owner of that band is an admirer of the Indian peace policy.

General Custer, who is exploring the Black Hills, says the country over which the expedition passed is beautiful, producing a great variety of vegetation, admirably adapted to agriculture, with a variety of useful timber on the hillsides, while the valleys are clear and ready for the plow. The streams are of pure cold water, and judging by the vegetation, there is an abundance of rainfall through the whole region. Scientists accompanying the expedition report the presence of gold, silver and lead in paying quantities. Gold bearing quartz crops out from every hill, and the valley or placer diggings, as far as tested, promise well. As an evidence of their richness, fifty pieces of virgin gold, averaging the size of a pin-head, were washed from a pan of dirt. Full details of the country may be expected when the scientists who accompany the expedition make their final report.

Advices from Northern Montana report the death of Black Eagle, one of the head Piegan chiefs, July 28, at Badger creek, by a Blackfoot Indian. The Indians had possessed

themselves of a good supply of tarantula juice from some of the large number of traffickers in that section, and proceeded to have a grand old time, when an "unpleasantness" arose between Black Eagle and the Blackfoot Indian. It transpired that the latter could carry his load better, and could handle himself with more dexterity than the former, and consequently got away with his man in good shape. A brother of Black Eagle chanced to be one of the party, and was also pretty well "set up" with "forty-rod." He saw his chief kinsman go down before his very eyes, and his wrath was kindled thereat. With vengeance beaming from that hitherto benevolent-looking countenance, he seized his weapons of war, and with an ear-piercing whoop went for the Blackfoot hombre with such persistent energy and vigor that he not only killed him, but another red skin who thought to put in his shovel and get away with some of the chicken pie, and was soon triumphantly swinging two scalps high in air and generally comporting himself in true Indian style. Black Eagle is the Indian who murdered Quail in the fall of 1870, near Silver City.

Apple and crumb pudding is delicious: Grease the pan a very little; then put a layer of apples in the bottom, then a layer of crumbs, then a little sugar, and so on until the dish is filled. Pour a little water in and cover over with a tin or plate, and set on top of the stove and let it remain until the apples are nearly cooked; then put in the oven and let it nicely brown over. Apples should be the last layer. Eat with milk or cream and sugar. This pudding will bake very quick.

Now that feathers are so much worn, trimming can be made at home with very little trouble. The white soft feathers of the duck and goose can be sewn on to tape about two inches wide, and made into trimming for black net or white evening dresses. For day dresses, mixed feather trimming could be used and made up of all sorts of feathers. This is very quick work.

John E. Baker, aged 26, and Charles Crouch, aged 18, were executed at Shasta, Cal., on the 26th, the former for the murder of George Cline, the mail rider, and the latter for the murder of a Mrs. Radler. Baker said he had no statement to make; Crouch said he had repented, and believed God had forgiven his sins. As both their necks were broken in the fall death was almost instantaneous.
