For this amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to meet expenses incurred by the Department of the In-terior in investigating alleged frauds in the payment of bounties to members of the First, Second, and Third Regi-ments of Indian Home-Guerds during the years eighteen hundred and sev-enty-one and eighteen hundred and seventy-two, two thousand eight hun-dred and thirty-four dollars and fifteen

cents. Sec. 2. That the sum of fifteen thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to relieve the ne-cessities of the Chippewa Indians atserving without compensation, ap-pointed by the President under the provisions of the fourth section of the

act of April tenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, is hereby appropriated; and said Board of Indian Commissioners is hereby continued with all the powers and duties conferred and imposed by existing laws. But nothing herein provided shall be construed to supersede or interfere with the duty heretofore imposed upon said board of commissioners to visit Indian agencies and inspect the vouchers, books and papers thereof. Sec. 3. That for the purpose of in-

ducing Indians to labor and become self-supporting, it is hereby provided that is distributing the same shall re-quire all able-bodied male Indians, between the ages of eighteen and fortyfive to perform service upon the reservation, for the benefit of themselves, or of the tribe, at a reasonable rate, to be fixed by the agent in charge, and to an amount equal in value to the supplies to be delivered. And the allowances provided for such Indians shall be distributed to them only upon condition of the performance of such labor, under such rules and regulations as the agent may prescribe: Provided, That the Secretary of the Interior may, by written order, except any particuhar tribe from the operation of this provision where he deems it proper and expedient. Sec. 4. That none of the money

appropriated in this act shall be used to pay salaries or allowances of any kind to employees at agencies except where it is expressly appropriated for such purpose; excepting the contin-gent fund and the incidental fund, and except in cases herein otherwise provided not more than six thousand dollars shall be paid for the salaries of employees at any one agency, in addi-tion to the salary of the agent and in-terpreter, and not more at any agency than is absolutely necessary; and In dian agents shall be required to state, under oath, upon rendering their quarterly accounts, that the number of emplayers elaimed for were actually and oons tide employed at the agency and the salary claimed; and that such agent does not, directly or indirectly, receive any part of the compensation claime? for any other employee, or any pecuniary benefit therefrom: Pro-. e Secretary of the Interior, and the officers charged by law with the distribution of supplies to the Indians, uner the appropriations provided for in this net, to distribute them and pay them out to the Indians entitled to them, in such proper proportions as that the amount of appropriation shall not be expended before the end of the current year, so as to prevent deficiencies; and no expenditure shall be made or liability incurred on the part of the Government on account of the Indian service for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, unless in compliance with exisning law, beyond the amount of money previously appropriated for said service during said year: Pracided, That hereafter all bidders under any advertisement published by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs for proposals for goods, supplies, transportation, and so forth, for and on account of the Indian service, whenever the value of the goods, supplies, and so forth, to be furnished, or the transpor tation to be performed, shall exceed the sum of five thousand dollars, shall accompany their bids with a certified check or draft payable to the order of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, upon some United States depository or solvent national bank, which check or draft shall be five per centum on the amount of the goods, supplies, trans-portation and so forth, as aforesaid; and in case any such bidder, on being awarded a contract, shall fail to exeente the same with good and sufficient sureties according to the terms on which such bid was made and accepted, such bidder shall forteit the amount so so deposited to the United States into the Treasury of the United States; but if such contract shall be duly executed, as aforesaid, such draft or check so deposited shall be returned to the

That the several appropriations here made for teachers, millers, blacksmiths, engineers, carpenters, physicians, and other persons, and for various articles provided for by treaty stipulations, may be diverted to other uses for the benefit of various Indian tribes, within the discretion of the President, and with the consent of said tribes expressed in the usual man ner; and that he cause report to be made to Congress, at the next session thereafter, of his action under this provision. Sec. 10. That no agent or employe

of the United States Government, or of any of the Departments thereof, while in the service of the Government, shall have any interest, directly or indirectly, contingent or absolute. near or remote, in any contract made, or under negotiation, with the Gov-ernment, or with the Indians, for the purchase or transportation or delivery of goods or supplies for the Indians, or for the removal of the Indians; nor shall any such agent or employée collude with any person who may atthe purpose of enabling such person to obtain the same. The violation of any of the provisions of this section shall be a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by a fine of not less than five hundred dollars nor more than five thousand dollars, and by removal from office: and, in addition thereto the court shall, in its discretion, have the power to punish by imprisonment of not more than six month

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
