PUBLIC SPEAKING.—Early Tuesday morning Hon. Henry Warren, Republican candidate for Congress, and Hon. Lafayette Lane, Democratic candidate for Congress, arrived in this city, to fill their appointments here in the afternoon of that day. Later in the day, Rev. Mr. Dimmick, Temperance candidate, and Rev. Mr. Whitney, Independent candidate, put in an appearance. By previous arrangement Mr. Warren opened the discussion at the Court House, about 1 o'clock P. M. in a manner so irrepressible, delivered in such a manner as to carry conviction to all reasoning minds. It certainly was an able presentation of the truth, and did a vast amount of good, as the 25th of October will prove. As to the speeches or talks by Messrs. Dimmick and Whitney, we have nothing special to say. As they are not in this fight, it really isn't worth while to notice them, other than to say that they exhibited themselves as best they could, probably, under the circumstances, apparently feeling all the time their presence was an imposition, and the time they occupied unprofitable to themselves or the people. Mr. Lane did not come up to the mark, and left a less favorable impression upon the Democracy here than he did in his "ratification" speech in the same place just after his nomination. If we are to believe the assertion of Democrats here, Mr. Lane would have received more votes in Linn county if he had followed in the footsteps of the late Mr. Le Dow, and remained at home. So ended the first session.

ESTABLISH THE GRADE.—One of the drawbacks to building brick buildings in the business portion of our city, is the establishment of a grade. This is a matter certainly that should be attended to now. We are inclined to believe that if the City Council will employ a competent person at a reasonable figure to establish such grade, it will meet with the universal approval of our citizen property-holders. We are informed that the requisite work can be secured now for about half what has heretofore been charged, and if this be true, now is the time to go for it.

LEBANON.—A flying visit to Lebanon last Saturday afternoon, gave us a chance to see for ourselves that the town is growing in importance and wealth. We noticed extensive improvements since our last visit, and the place seemed lively and full of business. As an evidence of the good political judgment of the people, we were informed that Lebanon would give Hon. Henry Warren a large majority for Congress. The fine bridge across the Santiam near Lebanon, is progressing rapidly, and will be a masterpiece of mechanical skill and ingenuity. The completion of this bridge will add largely to the business interests of Lebanon, and her people are correspondingly happy.

Money is scarce and dear in San Francisco at present, with no prospects of relief until about the first of next month. As the finances here are controlled more or less by the condition of things there, we cannot much expect ease in money matters before the middle of October. It is confidently expected that by that time there will be money here to move the wheat, when lively times may be expected.

We note no improvement in the price of wheat in San Francisco, shippers offering \$1 55 1/2, while millers are paying \$2 02 1/2 for choice grades. Oats are quoted at \$1 05 1/2 for light grades, and \$1 75 1/2 for best. Potatoes quoted at \$1 30 1/2 to \$1 72, as to grade.

We have no Portland quotations. In the absence
