Good News to Wheat Growers.

Again are the farmers of Oregon reaping the beneficial application of the old saying that "it is an ill-wind which blows nobody good." And this time the wind which prostrates the great wheat-producing portion of the mighty Empire of Russia is the great pro-ducer of our own farthest Northwestern State of the Union.

These are the facts; now for the causes. Odessa is the wheat field of Russia. It is from there that the British grain markets used to draw the 11, 100,000, or nearly one-half of their total imports of wheat when the imports from the United States used to average only about 14,000 tons.

Hot in 1874 the statistics showed that while the imports from Russia into British markets had slightly increased since 1857, and comprised 21,100 tons of the total imports there, the imports from the United States had increased to an enormous volume, and constituted 44, 100,000 of the total imports.

There is a project on foot for the erection upon one of the islands in the harbor of New York of a colossal bronze statue dedicated to the Liberty and commemoration of the hundredth anniversary of American independence.

This mighty veteran offering to the Goddess of Liberty is to be erected, says the Tablet, by the joint labor, wealth and genius of the two greatest modern republics—America will erect the pedestal, one hundred and seventeen feet in height, and France is to crown it by a magnificent bronze figure eighty-three feet high.

The figure will represent the Goddess of Liberty, diademed like a divinity, bearing aloft in one hand a torch, from which blazing fire shall serve as a beacon to ships entering the port. This splendid figure will be not less than two hundred and twenty-five feet above the water of the harbor.

The idea is a grandiose, although not altogether original, if we may believe in the celebrated works of Phidias, his Zeus and his Athena, the marble statue of New that adorns the vestibule of his famous golden house at Rome; the gilded statue of Nebuchadnezzar, and that other wonderful colossal bronze image known as the Colossus of Rhodes.

It is the observation of historians that the era of erecting great statues designated by the name of the King of Kings or conqueror, or a conqueror, and the decline of a nation, or to minister to the vanity of individuals or great men, we hope that it is not significant of the decline of the American nation. This statue is to be erected on an island, it is to be the firm and solid embodiment of national liberty; its structure is to commemorate the fact that a commonwealth, in enjoying its freedom for a hundred years, and has to that extent, demerited the capacity of an intelligent people to govern itself.

The Colossus of Rhodes only stood for little over half a century, and then for a few years' years in ruins. Let us hope that so long as American liberty can be maintained, so long as Republican Government may stand, to commemorate the achievements of a free people. And let us hope, also, that the friendly sun, which so graciously allows itself to rays in creating this statue of liberty, may, in a hundred years, have passed since France became a Republic, receive from our then great, wealthy and prosperous people a similar dedication of generosity, to commemorate the fact that France has successfully passed her first centennial as a Republican Government.
