CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS
ADOPTED BY
LISS ENGINE CO., NO. 2,
ALBANY, OREGON, AUGUST 28, 1876.

CONSTITUTION.
ARTICLE I.
This Company shall be known as LISS
ENGINE COMPANY, NO. 2.
ARTICLE II.
The officers of this Company shall be a
President, Recording Secretary, Financial
Secretary, Treasurer, Foreman, First As-
sistant Foreman and Second Assistant
Foreman, to be elected annually, at the
first regular meeting in September of each
year, who shall serve until their successors
are elected and installed.

ARTICLE III.
No person shall be elected a member of
this Company who is under the age of
twenty-one years, or resides outside of the
corporate limits of Albany.
ARTICLE IV.
All candidates for membership in this
Company shall be proposed by a member
thereof at any meeting, fire or drill. The
member making or offering the proposi-
tion, shall state the name, age, occupation,
and residence of the person proposed,
which proposition shall be accompanied by
the sum of one dollar; said proposition
shall be handed to the Investigating Com-
mittee, and the aforesaid sum to the Fi-
nancial Secretary, which sum shall be con-
sidered the initiation fee of the candidate if
elected, to be returned to him if rejected.

ARTICLE V.
All candidates shall be elected by ballot,
and if not more than five ball ballots ap-
pear in the box after the ballot, he shall be
declared elected; but if more than five are
deposited he shall be declared rejected; if
Provided, one re-ballot may be taken, upon
a motion being made, and sustained by
two-thirds of the members present; but
no candidate shall be balloted for unless he
shall have been reported favorably to the
Company by the Investigating Committee.

ARTICLE VI.
All officers of this Company shall be
subject to impeachment and trial for im-
proper conduct, or incompetency, at the
written request of six members of the Com-
pany; and with the concurrence of two-
thirds of those present, shall be removed
from office; Provided, that no officer shall
be so tried and removed without a hearing.
ARTICLE VII.
If any member shall absent himself from
three successive fires; or neglect three regu-
lar meetings; or neglect to pay his fines
or dues for three months; or use insulting
language to an officer; or be guilty of
destroying or defacing, or appropriating
to his own use, any property belong-
ing to the Company; or if he shall be
guilty of conduct which, in the opinion of
the Company, renders him an improper
associate, he may be expelled from the
Company; Provided, he shall first be not-
ified by the Secretary, and have an op-
portunity to be heard.

ARTICLE VIII.
At the regular meeting in May of each
year, three Delegates to the "Albany Fire
Department" shall be elected from the
Company.
ARTICLE IX.
The By-Laws, hereinafter adopted by
this Company, shall be equal and binding
with the Constitution, and no amendment
shall be made to either, unless proposed in
writing, at a regular meeting, and laid over
until the next regular meeting, and con-
curred in by two-thirds of all the members
present.

BY-LAWS.
ARTICLE I.
Meetings.—The regular meetings of this
Company shall be on the first Monday of
each month, from the 1st of November
to the 1st of May at 7 o'clock P. M., and
during the remainder of the year at 7:30
o'clock P. M. Twelve members shall con-
stitute a quorum to transact business, and
unless in the Constitution or By-Laws
otherwise provided, a majority shall gov-
ern.
ARTICLE II.
Duties of Officers.—President.—The Pres-
ident shall preside at all meetings; preserve
order; conduct all meetings in conformity
with parliamentary usage; see that the
Constitution and By-Laws are strictly en-
forced; sign all orders and checks ordered
by the Company and drawn by the Secre-
tary upon the Treasurer; call special meet-
ings when necessary, or when requested in
writing by six members of the Company.
ARTICLE III.
Secretary.—It shall be the duty of the Re-
cording Secretary to keep a correct roll of
the names of the members of the Compa-
ny, and to call the same after every alarm
of fire, or regular drill, or other duty of
the Company, immediately after housing
the Engine, and at every regular meeting,
and to note absentees and report them to
the President at next regular meeting; to
keep a true account of all proceedings, to
take charge of all books, papers and docu-
ments, and to conduct the correspondence
of the Company, under the supervision of
the President; to notify all those elected
to membership in the Company, within
three days thereafter, and to notify the
members of all special meetings. Also to
keep a book of Fire Records in which he
shall note the date of each fire, its loca-
tion, and such other remarks as may be
useful to the Department; the names of

members present and absent from said
fires. He shall also keep in the minutes
of each regular meeting the names of those
present and absent, and appropriate in-
dexes to said "Fire Record" and Minute
book of said meetings.
ARTICLE IV.
Financial Secretary.—It shall be the duty
of the Financial Secretary to collect, and
keep a true account of all moneys due to
the Company and pay the same over to the
Treasurer, together with a written state-
ment of the nature of the amount received,
taking the Treasurer's receipt for the same;
to keep all books, papers and documents in
his possession ready for inspection by the
President, Finance Committee, or a com-
mittee appointed for the purpose, at all
times, and to deliver the same to his suc-
cessor in office; and at every annual meet-
ing of the Company for the election of offi-
cers, he shall present a full report of all
business appertaining to his office from the
commencement of his term.
ARTICLE V.
Treasurer.—The Treasurer shall take
charge of all funds belonging to the Compa-
ny, and give such security for the faith-
ful performance of his duties as may be
from time to time required by the Com-
pany; report at each quarterly meeting,
or oftener if called upon by the Company,
the amount of money received and dis-
bursed by him; pay all bills or checks
drawn upon him and signed by the Secre-
tary and President; and perform such
other duties as may be imposed upon him
by the Company.
ARTICLE VI.
Foreman.—It shall be the duty of the
Foreman to take command of the Compa-
ny at all times; to see that the Apparatus,
Hose, and everything appertaining thereto,
be kept in good order and repair; to see
that every officer and member performs
his duty; to secure the services of a com-
petent Engineer and such assistants as may
be necessary—leaving the compensation of
Engineers to be determined by the Com-
pany. He shall have power to appoint a
Steward whose duty, under the supervision
of the Foreman, shall be to keep the En-
gine, Engine House and Hall ready for
use and occupancy of the Company, and
who shall receive such compensation for
said service as the Company shall deter-
mine.
ARTICLE VII.
First Assistant Foreman.—It shall be the
duty of the First Assistant Foreman to aid
the Foreman in the discharge of his duties,
to take special charge of the Engine and
apparatus, to keep them in good order
and repair, subject to the Foreman, and
when on duty to have immediate charge of
the Engine and Engine-men, and in the
absence of the Foreman to assume his of-
ficial duties, and to call the Second Assis-
tant to the post which he vacates. He shall
also have power to nominate, with the ap-
proval of the Company, four "Suction Hose
Men" and four "Tongue Men."

ARTICLE VIII.
Second Assistant Foreman.—It shall be
the duty of the Second Assistant Foreman
to take charge of the "leading hose," and
he shall appoint, with the approval of the
Company, sixteen "Leading Hose-men,"
who shall rank in the order of their ap-
pointment; and in the absence of the
Foreman and First Assistant, he shall have
command.
ARTICLE IX.
Private Matters.—No member or officer
shall disclose, to any person, the manner
of his vote on any matter; nor to any per-
son outside of the Company any matter of
private interest in the Company.
ARTICLE X.
Pay of Secretaries.—The Recording and
Financial Secretaries shall receive the fol-
lowing compensation for their services, to-
wit: The Recording Secretary shall re-
ceive the sum of one dollar for each meet-
ing of the Company, except fires, drills
and parades; and the Financial Secretary
shall be entitled to receive the sum of
twelve dollars per annum, payable quar-
terly; said Secretaries to be paid by orders
on Treasurer, signed by the President and
Secretary.

ARTICLE XI.
Fines and Dues of Members.—Each mem-
ber shall contribute the sum of twenty-five
cents per month towards defraying the ex-
penses of the Company; besides they shall
be subject to be fined as follows, to-wit:
For absence from fire alarms when
Engine does not work. . . . \$0 50
For absence from regular drills. . . . 25
For absence from meeting. . . . 25

ARTICLE XII.
Fines of Officers.—All officers of this
Company shall be exempt from the pay-
ment of all monthly dues, but shall be sub-
ject to be fined in double the sum assessed
or imposed upon a member for the same
offense.
ARTICLE XIII.
Roll Call.—At each regular meeting of
the Company there shall be two Roll-calls,
one immediately after the call to order and
the other immediately prior to adjournment;
absence from either shall subject the
party to fine as provided in Articles II
and IX; but the delinquent may address the
President explaining his delay or absence,
and his excuse be satisfactory to the Compa-
ny, the fine shall be remitted; there
shall also be roll-call immediately after
housing the Engine after each fire alarm
or regular drill.

ARTICLE XIV.
Miscellaneous Provisions.—It shall be the
duty of each member, within sixty days
after receiving notice of his election, to
sign the Constitution and By-Laws, and to
provide himself with the uniform adopted
and now worn by the Company; and no
person shall be entitled to the rights and
privileges of a member until he shall have
conformed to this provision.
ARTICLE XV.
Alarms.—It shall be the duty of each
member of the Company, on every alarm
of fire, to proceed immediately to the En-
gine House—unless he is confident the En-
gine or Hose Carriage has previously left—
to assist in conveying the Engine or Hose
Carriage to the fire; to remain where it
is stationed, unless otherwise ordered by
an officer; to assist in working the same;
and to obey all orders of the commanding
officer. Should the Engine or Hose Carriage
be gone before his arrival at the
House, he shall immediately proceed to
join the Company, with all possible dis-
patch, either on the way or at the fire, and
place himself under the direction of the
officer commanding the Company.
ARTICLE XVI.
Leave of Absence.—Any member leaving
the city shall first notify the President,
Secretary, or Foreman, of his intention; and
if absent for more than sixty days
without permission of the Company, he
shall be considered as having resigned.
ARTICLE XVII.
Exemption.—All members absent with
leave of the Company shall be exempt
from fines but liable to dues and assess-
ments during absence.
ARTICLE XVIII.
Excuses for Not Voting.—Any member
may be excused from voting on any ques-
tion before the Company by a majority of
the members present; and no member
shall vote on any question, in the case of
which he is personally interested.
ARTICLE XIX.
Expulsion.—No member shall be ex-
pelled from the Company unless he has
been notified by the Secretary that charges
are preferred against him, and be furnished
with a copy of said charges against him,
a reasonable length of time, to enable him
to prepare for trial; and all such ex-
pulsions shall be by ballot, and require the
concurrence of two-thirds of the members
present.
ARTICLE XX.
Appeals.—All appeals from fines im-
posed by the President, when the validity
of the excuse is involved, shall be to the
Company.
ARTICLE XXI.
Resignations.—No resignation of a mem-
ber shall be accepted, nor leave of absence
granted, unless all fines, dues and assess-
ments are discharged, except by a vote of
two-thirds of the members present, and in
all cases the resignation or request for
leave of absence must be made in writing
or personally at a meeting.
ARTICLE XXII.
Meeting of Voting.—All voting at any
meeting of the Company shall be "ayes"
and "noes," unless otherwise specially
provided in the Constitution or By-Laws,
or ordered by the Company.
ARTICLE XXIII.
Drills.—There shall be a regular drill on
the third Tuesday of each month in the
year.
ARTICLE XXIV.
Misconduct.—Insubordination of any
member on drill or parade, intoxication,
disobedience to officers, or disorderly con-
duct at fire or drill, shall be reported by
the officer in command and fined by the
Company not less than fifty cents nor more
than five dollars.
ARTICLE XXV.
All Constitutions and By-Laws hereto-
fore adopted and in force in this Company
are hereby repealed.
FAST TIME.—A package containing im-
portant papers was mailed at Portland,
Oregon, for this city on the 18th of Au-
