PUBLIC SPEAKING.

Upon special invitation Addison C. Gibbs, Oregon's old War Governor, and Hon. M. C. George, Senator from Multnomah county, but who got his start in Old Lin, will address the Hayes and Wheeler Club of this city this evening at the Opera House. The ladies of the city are specially invited to attend. The Glee Club, composed of ladies and gentlemen, will be in attendance and furnish splendid music. Let the house be crowded.

LOOKS LIKE "SKULLDUGGERY."

Hon. D. K. Warren, joint State Senator elect for Clatsop, Columbia and Tillamook counties to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. Sol. H. Smith, has been prevented from taking his seat because of the non-arrival of the official returns from Columbia county. As the Legislature now stands there are but 89 members in the joint convention, and 45 votes being a majority, will elect. With Mr. Warren admitted there will be 90 members, and it will take 46 to elect. The ballot for Senator on Wednesday showed 44 for Grover, 32 for Applegate, 11 for Nesmith, and 2 for Campbell. Should the Grover opposition center on Applegate, he will be elected, and we will have a noble Senator. But this holding back the official returns of Columbia county looks like "skulduggery," and will prove a losing game to Democracy in the long run. We shall see.

TILDEN FAILS TO ANSWER.

The charge of perjury made against Mr. Tilden still goes unrefuted. The New York Times has been hunting up facts in the case, and now asserts that Mr. Tilden's income for the year in question, instead of seven thousand dollars, was about one hundred thousand dollars. The more the matter is investigated the worse it looks for Mr. Tilden. The facts seem to be indisputable that Mr. Tilden, while making the loudest professions of honesty and reform, has actually been a "usufructuary" all these years.

DEMOCRATIC APPEAL TO MASONRY.

The Portland Standard says that Gen. Albert Pike made a red-hot Tilden and Hendricks speech in Southern Oregon recently, and asks Masons to "remember that." We hardly think that Pike made a political speech, as gentlemen out on Masonic business hardly ever so far forget themselves. Pike was among the first Brigadiers commissioned by Jeff. Davis—was a red-hot rebel during the war, and his utterances now will have no more effect on loyal Masons than the political utterances of any other former rebel.

Scobey, the Democratic candidate for Elector-at-large in Indiana, is what might be termed a "ratler." He has been indicted for forgery, has been prosecuted for withholding money collected for his clients, and has had a suit instituted to deprive him from practice before the courts. Notwithstanding all this, Scobey's bosom heaves for reform, and his eyes glitter when he reads of Republican dishonesty!

Grover's chances seem to be on the wane. A great pressure, it is understood, is being made to substitute Bush for Grover in certain Democratic quarters.

Wm. Cullen Bryant, despite the assurances of our contemporary, says most heartily he will not support the Democratic nominees, but will vote for Hayes and Wheeler.

ON TRIAL.

Our "usufruct," hard-soft-money Democrat, "R.E. Form," wants to know why Republican speakers in this canvass don't go after Babcock, Scheinck and others, instead of "Reform" Tilden, the perjurer. Well, as a journalist we are called upon to enlighten even the most besotted Democratic ignorance, and we proceed to do so by telling him what all the world but "R. E. Form" seems to know already, that the parties first mentioned are not now on trial—Tilden is. Tilden is the candidate of the Confederate Democracy for the office of President, you must know, and as such his qualifications, moral, intellectual and social, are matters of discussion. We see it announced that a bill has been presented in the Legislature granting a twenty years' franchise for water works in this city. THE OREGON LEGISLATURE.

This body is grinding along slowly, as yet not having transacted any very important business. Probably the real hard work of the session will not be commenced until the excitement consequent upon the election of a United States Senator is over. We will give a full report of all important matters as our columns will allow.

The Milwaukee (Wis.) *Sentinel* remarks:—Mr. Samuel McBride, of Colorado, was a delegate to the St. Louis Convention where he united with Smelter in bursts of enthusiasm for Tilden and Reform. He was also a member of the committee to notify Gov. Tilden of his nomination. Returning home, saturated through and through with Democratic reform, he immediately stole \$13,000 of the school fund of Pueblo county, and absconded. By the way, there is something suggestive in the fact that Democratic defaulters seem to delight in getting away with money belonging to the schools.

The Rochester Democrat says:—The standards of Republicanism are today exalted ones. They are exacting standards, and few there may be who are able to conform to them; but they are no more exacting than they should be. The party owes no man anything. It does owe to itself—that sentiment which has become dominant—that its standard-bearer should be one on whom all can unite, because he can command that unity which is essential to victory. This is not the time to take care of men because they have been useful as wheel-horses.

A correspondent of the *Baltimore Gazette* (Dem.) after making a thorough canvass of all that part of North Carolina where the Democrats are strongest, gives it as his reluctant conclusion that the State will go Republican.

Foghorn Allen (old Bill) will not support Tilden. He says he will try and swallow the State ticket, but when it comes to the national pill it won't go down.

Condensed Lightning.

Cash admissions to the Centennial on the 16th \$91,891.

D. B. Bean, of Patterson, N. J., has failed for \$820,000.

Ten thousand veterans will camp at Indianapolis on the 20th and 21st.

Prince Imperial's visit to this country has been indefinitely postponed.

Three saw mills at Ousma, Me., worth \$30,000, were burned on the 16th.

A fire on Daune street, New York, on the 15th caused damage amounting to \$55,000.

The election held in Louisiana, on the 15th passed off quietly, 50 shots being exchanged.

A Cincinnati salesman named Kaufman drowned himself in the Ohio river on the 17th instant.

The greenback party had a big torch light procession at Terre Haute, Indiana, on the 16th instant.

A stranger named Hathaway killed three colored men at Monroe, La., on the 17th. He is in prison.

It is rumored, though denied, that yellow fever has reached Baltimore. 16 cases as yet no deaths.

A well known Ohio river pilot named Clark committed suicide at Newport on the 17th inst. by hanging.

The cities of New York and St. Louis have opened subscription lists for the aid of the Savannah sufferers.

Prof. Huxley, surprised by the exhibition of California fruit at the Centennial, says he will soon visit that State.

F. H. Conant & sons' chair factory at Camden, N. Y., was burned on the 10th. Loss, \$60,000.

Wheeler Bros. have brought to Fort Laramie \$300,000 in gold dust from the Black Hills after seven months run.

The 19th was the day fixed for taking the arms and ponies from the Indians at different agencies. It was thought they will quietly submit.

Julius Marson, Danish Vice Consul at Porto Rico, was killed on the steamship Cambria on the 17th, by a sudden lurch which threw him violently against the Bulwarks.

A portion of the roofs of the main exhibition building and machinery hall at Philadelphia were blown away on the 17th. Trees were blown down and several persons injured.

On the 8th a Sioux village containing 41 lodges was attacked by a detachment of Crooks' troops and completely routed; a large amount of horses, ammunition and provisions was captured. From wounds received Lieut. Von Lutwitz's leg had to be amputated. Chief American Horse has died of his wounds. Gen. Sheridan is at Fort Laramie. With the exception of Crazy Horse and Sitting Bull the hostiles are going into the agencies.

Naval officers awaiting orders are very indignant over Hobson's order to decrease their pay one half.

Five hundred thousand five per cent. bonds held to secure circulation, were withdrawn from the Treasury and 4½ per cents substituted.

Turkey expects Serbia to pay a war indemnity in case of peace.

The Canadian government has effected a treaty with Indians there.

The cervians have obtained 60,000 muskets and several mitrailleuses from Prussia.

The Porte has appointed a new commission to investigate the Bulgarian atrocities.

An agreement to suspend hostilities between the Servians and Turks for ten days has been signed.

Wm. M. Tweed and Wm. Hunt will be embarked at Corunna for Cuba as prisoners on the 21st inst.

The Porte has promised to redress grievances and the Powers look upon its peace propositions with favor.

The existence of a treaty between Russia and Germany providing for the settlement of the Eastern question is denied in St. Petersburg.

One of the Porte's peace propositions is that Serbia shall send back all persons who emigrated to that country from Turkish provinces.

A protestant pastor at San Fernando has been ordered by the mayor to keep the door of his church shut, as otherwise devotions would be external manifestations prohibited by the constitution.

A dispatch of the 18th says the Turkish commanders have been ordered to discontinue hostilities. Prince Milan has sent similar orders to General Tcherniaff and other Servian commanders. The armistice may be terminated by either party giving notice.

The Republican majority in Maine is 15,450.

Frank Prosser has been arrested, suspected with complicity in the St. Lake express robbery.

Prof. Spoell of Amherst College, died on the 18th.

A gale on the Chesapeake bay sank 10 barges and drowned 8 persons.

Charles Davis, the well known mathematician of Columbia College and West Point, is dead.

The Washington County Fair will commence on the 25th.

Levi Leland is lecturing on temperance in Marion county.

A movement is on foot to bridge the Willamette at Oregon City.

Thirteen mills on the dollar is the tax in Lane county for this year.

It is estimated Queen's circus took in \$2,000 at the door at Jacksonville.

The Oregon State Woman Suffrage Association meets on the 26th inst.

G. W. May has been appointed justice of the peace for Upper Molalla.

The Brownsville wooden mills have a new boiler for their dry house.

The wheat crop around Buena Vista will average 20 bushels to the acre.

The Deep creek bridge, Clackamas county, has been finished—cost, \$857.

Jennie Stella is the name of the new schooner launched last week at Marshfield.

The land office investigation has disclosed 8 fraudulent claims from this State.

A large black lion belonging to Montgomery Queen's circus died at Rock Point last week.

The Indians of Joseph's band still persist in their demands for the surrender of McNeill and Findley.

The last annual report gave 600 cases of smallpox for the whole of England and Wales.

Hon. L. L. McArthur, Judge of the Fifth Judicial District, returned from a Centennial trip a few days ago.

The Dallas City Mills formerly owned by Robert Peckham, Esq., has been sold to Messrs. Schmidt & Co., of Portland.
