HAYES AND WHEELER CLUB.

ALBANY, OR., Sept. 22, 1876.

Hayes and Wheeler Club met pursuant
to adjournment, President, J. F. Back-
ensto, in the Chair.

The Glee Club entertained the audience
with several pieces of music, national and
campaign, in most excellent style, when
the President introduced ex-Governor
Gibbs, Oregon's old War Governor. The
Governor, who is a most agreeable and
ready speaker, entertained the large audi-
ence at some length discussing the political
issues of the day. He gave a lucid de-
scription of the two elements of the Demo-
cratic party, both of which, he main-
tained, sanction principles dangerous to
the welfare of the nation, and one of which,
to tolerate at all; would be ruinous to
American liberty and prosperity. In this
latter element he placed Samuel J. Tilden,
the Democratic party's leader and stand-
ard-bearer. He also presented the prin-
ciples of the modern reformer
