NOTABLE FACT.

It is a significant fact that no American who ever opposed the prosecution of a war in which his country was involved, with a solitary exception, was ever elected to the Presidency.

Take the Revolutionary War 1776. Many men of high social position, ta ent and integrity, and estimable citizens in every other respect, joined the anti-war or Tory party. I he name ory was not at that time one of reproach, but signified one who was in lavor of the established order of things; but long before the war closed the word Fory was an epithet of reproach as much as the modern term "scalawag" is to-day, and the gentlemanly and cultivated Tories of the Revolution in New York, Pennsy vania, Virginia, and the caro inas sank into political insigniticance. After the war, to prove the charge of Torvism on a candidate, was to ruin him.

A still larger, more influental, cultivated, and wealthy cass of politicians sposed the war of 1812. They were known as the leaders of the Federal party. They were soon dubbed "Blue-Light Federalists," and were swept out of existence. What is Extracted Honey?

spicion is often manifested by con umers of honey, and the question is frequent y asked thow can people take much troub e to extract the honey rom the comb and then sell it for less than they do comb honey?" In order that grocerymen may answer this question satisfactorily we would say that the comb, which is a fatty, solid substance produced by bees, is first excreted from a row of pouches along trill, J. T. Fryer, Engene Hama, and out alread, their sides in the form of sea es. This being musticated and mixed with salivia becomes whitered and tenacions, teries of their honey and eggs. bees consume about three-fourths of whilst gathering the honey only regress apiraiaus take a snarp knife and skim off the tops of the cels, and with the extracting machine, throw the honey from the comb by centrifugal torce. The comb is then put back into the hive, the operation being repeated frequently during the season. This enables the bees to gather three times the quantity of honey by relieving them of the recessity of building their combs, hence the reason why there is always so much more extracred or "strained" honey on the market, and its consequen cheapness. The horey thus extracted possesses a most de icious flavor and can be eaten without fear of sickness It is enting the comb that makes one sick; the bees never eat it, and physicians say that there would be just a much propriety in drinking ale from a bottle and then eating the bottle as in eating the honey and comb also. They consider the glass about as digestible as the wax.
