OUR COMMON SCHOOLS. On this department of our system of education depends in a great measure the success of all subsequent culture of the mind. And if this department be neglected, and the pupil fails to receive, in this his earliest training and most lasting impressions, that instruction, both mental and moral, which is necessary to give proper bent to the mind and character, his education in the higher grades of learning will prove to be more or less a failure.

Assuming that the above assertions will be admitted by all, we will next consider what, in our opinion, is essential to make our common schools a success. There has been an opinion prevalent among those who have not given the subject sufficient thought, that any one, who has even the rudiments of a common education, without any special qualifications for training children may enter upon that all-important avocation. This is a mistaken and pernicious idea, as any one may readily discover by observing the fruitless toil of so many of our common school teachers who have chosen an occupation wholly beyond their capacity to fill.

Aside from the educational qualifications, the common school, or primary teacher must possess that superior talent of making himself, for the time being, a child, that he may better comprehend how to find access to the avenue of the mind. Here is the first requisite, is the right teacher in the right place. The next is a system of well graded schools. As experience in graded schools, wherever it has been given a trial, has furnished ample proof that more rapid and thorough progress has been made where the schools are properly graded and a systematic course of instruction given; it is the urgent duty of educators, and those interested with the educational interests of the people, to look to that end, and have our schools so classified that each grade may be separate, and presided over by that teacher who is specially fitted to take charge of that particular department. Our present principal deserves much credit for the earnest efforts he has made to bring about and establish a system of graded schools in this city; and has fully merited the support of the patrons of the school.

Backed as he is by an earnest and liberal board, who are ready to support whatever is progressive in the way of education, we do not think that he, with his assistant corps of teachers, will succeed in raising the schools of Albany to a rank second to none in the State.

LETTER FROM MONMOUTH. MONMOUTH, Or, Nov. 5th, 1876. Thinking that a few lines from these parts might be of interest to your readers, I send you an...

The city of Monmouth is situated in the southeastern part of Polk county, two and a half miles west of the Willamette river, and contains about 300 inhabitants. There are 2 dry goods and 1 drug store, two blacksmith shops and one harness shop, 1 furniture store, 1 tin shop, 1 printing office (the Christian Messenger), 1 district school, 1 church (Christian), and the Monmouth Christian College. The college was erected in 1872, and is a three-story brick, costing \$15,000. There are at present about twenty-five students in attendance. Prof. T. F. Campbell has charge of the school. The students connected with the College have four literary societies in running order. This is all for the present.
