Section 666 of the Code provides that: "If any person shall wilfully disturb or disquiet any assembly or congregation of people, met for religious worship, whether in a house or in the open air, by either attering any profane discourse, committing any rude or indecent act, or ,making any unnecessary noise, within the place where such meeting is held, or so near it as to disturb the order and selemnity thereof, such person, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not lessthan one mouth, nor more than six months, or by fine not less than ten dollars, nor more than two hundred dollars."
