UP THE SANTIAM.
FEBRUARY 26, 1877.
ED. REGISTER.—Left Albany the 26th; found my very bad. Noticed a great deal of fencing down—blown down by the high winds of Monday.
Arrived at Lebanon at 12 o'clock—everybody happy. Lebanon is a beautiful village, and is improving very fast. Left there at one o'clock, crossing the Santiam on the Lebanon bridge. Turning up the river I soon came to Messrs. Settlemier & Dawson's sawmill. Found the lady in the most excellent humor, as the first logs from the mountains had just arrived—and they were a magnificent lot of logs, too. They have a half million feet of logs ready to run down to the mill as soon as there is a sufficiency of water in the Santiam. The loggers say it is a very good stream to run logs on. It is about eight miles, by the stream, from the mill to the finest body of timber, in the Cascade Mountains. Some of the logs secured will make two thousand feet of lumber. If you want splendid lumber this is the place, and Settlemier & Dawson the men to get it of. They have probably the finest mill in the State, situated about 2 1/2 miles above Lebanon. They have a fair road now leading to it, which they intend to greatly improve as soon as the weather will permit in the Spring. They have let the contract to clear one hundred acres of rich bottom land, which, when done, will make one of the finest little farms in Linn county.
