

AN IMPORTANT ENTERPRISE.

EDITOR REGISTER . The atte the community is hereby called to the contemplated enterprise of putting freight boats on the Santiam Ditch, which will be undertaken by Mr. B. M. Kent, provided a contract can be effected with the owners of the Ditch on reasonable terms; and we hope they will be liberal in allowing freight to pass over the Ditch at the lowest possible rates, until such enterprise beomes thoroughly established.

When this is done, the tedlous process of hauling lumber, grain, and other produce, can be obviated. The best quality of inmber can be had at the mill of Messrs. Settlemeir & Dawson, and hauling a distance of 4 miles will bring it to the planing mill of Mr. S. A. Nickerson, where it can be prepared for building, and from there be placed on the boats with one handling, then glide smoothly down to the terminus of the Ditch, and from this point to many parts of town, it will cost the builder no more than to haul from the Albany mills, besides having lumber of the best quality the country affords. Rough lumber and cord-wood can be furnished to the farmers in the vicinity of the Ditch, as well as to the citizens of Albany, much cheaper by Ditch transportation. To farmers the question of hauling grain is the most im-

portant. We suggest that a small investment in lumber will build a platform and shade it over, on the bank of the Ditch, sufficient at least to hold the grain of one harvest company, at a cost of not more than \$15 or \$20, and the lumber not be injured for fencing or other purposes. And can we not make arrangements with persons desacked (if they want it so) ready for shipping? Or, if we store with the mills, one handling will place the grain on the cars from the boat, and will this cost the receiver more than to receive grain at Shedd or Tangent Station, which they do, if I am not mistaken, without cost to the pro-

Now what we want is to hear from the man that will do this in case the boats are put in. Who comes first to the front? Mr. Kent proposes to put in two boats, constructed on the flat-boat principle, coupled together, the capacity of which is thought to be sufficient to carry one thousand bushels of wheat, or that weight of lumber. We can assure the proprietors of the Ditch, and all others interested, that Mr. Kent is an honest thorough going business man, and can be relled on with certainty to fidfill his contracts, and the experience gained while boating for the Elkins Bro's., during the past two years, fully qualifies him for the undertaking of this important enter prise.

HANDSOME MONUMENT.-Messrs, Morgan & Staiger, at their marble yard on Broadalbin street in this city, have been turning out some of the bandsomest work in their line we have ever seen on the const. A visit to their establishment will convince anyone capable of appreciating beantiful work in marble, both in design and execution, that, no matter how rich and costly the monument or obelisk we may wish to erect to the memory of the departed loved ones, Messrs. Morgan & Staiger can execute the order as neatly and at as low a figure as elsewhere. At a recent visit to their place we particularly noticed a very handsome and elegant monument, just completed, to be erected in memory of the late Walter Monteith, Esq., which we will here attempt to describe: The lower sub-bese of the monument is two feet eight inches square; on this sits another granite base, two feet square and one foot six inches high, upon which rests the monument, which is of Italian marble. The lower base of the monument or marble column is handsomely molded, and the family name, Monteith, is elegantly and artistically carved on, in raised letters. The cutting of these letters is a work of no little labor and skill, requiring several days of close application to complete. Then comes an arched die with an octagon molding out on top, after which comes a beautifully finished octagon column rising several feet, gradually tapering towards the top, on which sits a heavily molded cap, the whole crowned with an urn, on which is carved, with the most exquisite taste and skill, a cluster of roses, with a ribbon twining among them, as it were a wreath tied on to the urn. A more elegant and tasteful tribute to modest worth, executed in marble, has never been erected in our cemetery; and the elegant simplicity which marks the work throughout, shows the possession of a high order of artistic excellence by Mr. Gus.
