FANCY GARDENING.—Is just what our friends F. M. Wadsworth and O. L. Parks, over in Benton county, about one mile from this city, are at present turning their attention to. They have acres of strawberry plants row in full bloom, from which they will gather during the season, should it be a favorable one, in the neighborhood of two hundred gallons of berries per day. They have several acres planted in blackberries, of the best varieties. During the two or three years they have been occupying their present place, they have secured one of the richest of garden spots where before stood dense fir thickets. They are preparing to supply this market with all the different berries from their garden—strawberries, blackberries, raspberries, currants, gooseberries, etc. A thrifty young orchard is also under way, and they will soon have cherries, pears, plums, apples, etc., in any quantity.
