### LOCAL MATTERS.

**LEBANON ITEMS.**  
Active measures are being taken in the railroad line which will soon be established, and right of way obtained. Mr. Wasson has been chosen by the stockholders as Director from this point, and has or soon will be confirmed by the Board of Directors of the W. V. & C. Railroad Co. It is the intention to commence grading the roadbed immediately after harvest, and it is calculated that the grading between this point and Corvallis will be finished by the first of December next. The citizens have subscribed considerable stock, although the agent, Mr. J. Wasson, has not as yet put forth much effort to obtain stock, because of not being supplied with the proper books. The books are now in his possession and he will immediately commence canvassing for aid. Mr. David Smith and William Peesler have agreed to grade the road through their farms, and the expected other or energetic farmers will do likewise.  
Our citizens who staid at home, with quite a crowd from the country, appropriately celebrated the nation's birthday with interest. Mr. Clifford Dunham orated in eulogistic manner of our glorious nation to a crowded street. Mr. C. B. Montague read the Declaration of Independence in a clear, forcible manner. Mr. J. L. Cowan acted as Chairman of the meeting, and also made some very forcible remarks. Mr. J. O. Roland acted as Marshal, while the Lebanon Brass Band worked at intervals give us some of the choicest national airs. We felt that although 101 years have elapsed since the first celebration of American Independence, yet we are as zealously attached to the country as then. A conspicuous banner was stretched across Main street, and directly on one side was erected a stand of sufficient height so that the several speakers could be distinctly seen and heard by the entire assembly. Mr. L. Ervin acted as gunner, having obtained an old cannon, and at intervals he would fire off his battery, leaving early in the day fired 101 shots in memory of the years of our Government.  
Considering it was an impromptu affair, our celebration to-day is considered to have been the best for years past.

**FROM PINE CREEK.**—From a private letter dated Pinecreek, W. T., June 26th, we are permitted to extract as follows: "Myself and three other men were camped in a new valley twenty-five miles north of this place, in the timber on a small creek, on the 24th, when a friendly Indian, very much excited, came and told us a man had been killed on Pine creek. I did not credit the news, but still I started for home, over another route leading away from the Indians, reaching here all right about 6 o'clock in the evening. I found the citizens fortified one mile from my place. Loui, a Couir d'Alene Indian, had just arrived with Bill Akitree's horse, which he had taken from an Indian, this latter Indian saying he had killed a man who had fired upon him and another Indian; in returning the fire the white man was killed, and the Indian took the horse. Knowing the horse, I and A. G. Queener and the Indian Loui, started for the house of Uncle John Ritchie, one and a half miles distant. Arriving at the house, I went in and found Ritchie lying just inside his own door, directly through the center of the breast; he had also been struck over the right eye with the poll of an ax and the ax left lying at his feet with some of deceased's gray hairs still clinging to it. Deceased was an old bachelor about 68 years of age. We then took the wagon and harness belonging to deceased, and took the body to the fort, burying him the next day as decently as we could. The friendly Indians say there is no danger except from straggling renegades. The neighbors generally are in fortification. The greatest difficulty at present is a lack of game and ammunition. Times, if it had not been for the Indians scarce would have been good. Emigration was pouring in, but that is all stopped. The crop prospect is excellent.
