City Council Proceedings.

Council met on Friday evening, January 2d, 1880, the full board present.
The committee to whom was referred the proposition of the Globe Gaslight Company, of San Francisco, with reference to lighting our streets at night, reported unfavorably to making any contract at the present time, which report was adopted.

In reference to hiring teams to haul the fire engines to and from fires, the Fire and Water Committee recommended postponement of the matter. Report adopted.

Under suspension of the rules the following bills were allowed:

Total amount of orders drawn, \$205 22.
The annual reports of the City Recorder, Marshal and Treasurer were read and referred to the committee on Accounts and Current Expenses.

An ordinance bill was then introduced abolishing hotel and boarding house licenses after March 31st, 1880, and under a suspension of the rules passed unanimously.

On motion, the Council adjourned to meet on Monday evening, January 5th, 1880, at 6 o'clock, and the Marshal was instructed to notify all the newly elected officers and members to be present at that time.

City Council met pursuant to adjournment, all the old and the new officers and members being present.

The committee to whom was referred the reports of the outgoing officers, not being ready to report, was granted further time.

A petition asking for a sidewalk on the north side of Ninth street, from Washington to Ferry, was presented, and on motion referred to appropriate committee.

The bill of City Treasurer for \$5.34, was presented, allowed, and under suspension of the rules, ordered paid.

Council then adjourned.

Lebanon Items.

From our correspondent under date of Dec. 31:

Railroad matters are at present engaging the attention of the enterprising class of this community. Mr. Luther Elkins, one of old Linn's most enterprising and energetic citizens, has taken an active part in the matter; has been to Portland investigating the probabilities of the construction of a long needed railroad from Albany to Lebanon. The citizens have appointed a meeting for the purpose of further investigating this enterprise.

On Christmas eve the students of the Santiam Academy, under the directorship of Prof. Gilbert, gave a fine literary entertainment, with great credit both to Prof. Gilbert as a first class educator, and to those who took part in the exercises. The house was well filled. The ladies furnished plenty of viands to all who remained to the sociable which immediately followed. We would be pleased to have our sons and daughters engage in such exercises more frequently.

Following items are under date of January 5th:

On the 1st instant, as previously arranged, the citizens of Lebanon met to take under advisement the proper initiatory steps in railroad matters. After the subject had been properly placed before the meeting, and many eloquent little speeches made in behalf of the interests of the people to secure by the building of a railroad, a committee consisting of five of the most substantial men of the town, were appointed to confer with the President of the O. & C. Railroad Company concerning the conditions of an early construction of the road. The people took great interest in a road that will connect with both the valley roads, and finally with Yaquina Bay.

On Monday, January 5th, our annual election for municipal officers occurred, on account of which it was unusually lively in town on that day. Notes from Wabburg, W. T.

WABURG, W. T., Dec. 27, 1879.
ED. REGISTER:—Thinking that a few items from this region will interest some of your readers, I will note a few.

I left Linn county about the first of October, intending to spend the winter "east of the Mountains." Stopped at Portland to visit relatives and witness the "Grant Reception," which was a grand affair, and then came up into the vicinity of the Dalles, stopping one week; thence to the Walla Walla Valley, and am now engaged in teaching near Wabburg, which is a thriving and busy town, about as large as Lebanon. I found several former citizens of Linn county in this vicinity, among whom are Messrs. Sylvester Canon and George S. Rogers, the former from near Albany, and the latter from Brownsville. Both are prospering nicely, and together with their families are among the most respected and influential citizens of this vicinity. The weather has been very cold here for the past few days, the mercury down to 13 or 20 degrees below zero, with snow 6 or 8 inches deep; but yesterday there came a "Chinook," getting away with the snow pretty rapidly.

A number of the citizens of Lebanon and vicinity came up into this "upper country" last fall, but I have not seen many of them, as none but myself stopped in this vicinity. We imagine that twenty degrees below zero would influence the average "Webfoot" to stay pretty close to the fire. Such was my experience. This valley exceeds the Willamette, by a large majority, as a wheat country, judging by this year's crop. REPORTER.

Letter from Prineville.

PRINEVILLE, January 1, 1880.

ED. REGISTER:—Our Christmas is over and a new year has come in, and according to agreement we will give you the result of our experiences.

The races were run on the day appointed. There were three horses entered: "Durock," owned by Mr. E. Barnes, of Prineville; "Nimrod," owned by Mr. Campbell, of The Dalles, and "Grey Eagle," also from The Dalles.

The snow was four inches deep on the track. Nimrod won the first heat in 1:55; the second heat was won by Durock in 2 minutes, with Nimrod close by. In the third heat, the horses came up in good shape and started, and the judges failed to tap them off, but the riders thought it was a go, and ran all the same in 2:5, Durock in the lead; but as it was no go, they had to try it again. In the fourth heat Durock came in ahead in 2:10, and walked off with the purse, Nimrod barely saving himself. Grey Eagle was shut out on the first heat.

The weather has been very severe. Two days before Christmas the mercury was down to 28 deg. below zero, and it has been very rough ever since. At present the Chinook wind is blowing and the snow is fast disappearing. Everything passed off in good order.
