Taking the Census.

Census Supervisor, Sukdorf, who has charge of the census of this State, will appoint his agents throughout the State in a short time. Portland will be divided into twelve districts, so as to rush the matter through in the shortest possible time. Following relating to the census will be read with interest:

All persons above the age of 21 years, who shall refuse to furnish the information required by the supervisors or enumerators shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding \$100, to be recovered as in an action of debt. Presidents, directors, or other officials of private corporations who refuse to furnish information required by the supervisors or enumerators shall be liable to a penalty not to exceed \$10,000. Only two weeks are allowed for the completion of the enumeration of the enumerators is the following: Two cents for each living inhabitant, two cents for each death reported, ten cents for each farm, fifteen cents for each millinery, which is to be in full for all services, and no mileage or traveling expenses. The subdivisions assigned to each enumerator must not exceed 4,000.

The REGISTER proposed to do the printing for the balance of the year (ten months) for \$17 50; or would print all notices, ordinances, etc., at 15 cents per thousand; quarter sheet hand bills at \$1 25 per 100; 8th sheet at \$1 per 100.

The Herald proposed to do the printing at one-fourth rate, to-wit: 23c per square (of ten lines) due insertion; all job printing at 3/4 the current rates.

The Democrat sent a communication, claiming that the printing had been duly and legally given to that paper, and the Democrat proposed to hold the city to its agreement.

On motion, of Martin all bids for printing were laid upon the table until next meeting.

Petition of B. Brenner for lamp on southwest corner of Third and Ellsworth (Ferry?) was referred to committee on streets and public property.

A remonstrance, signed by thirty-four citizens, was received asking the city to pay out no money for property on which to erect an engine house for Linn Engine Co., which was referred to committee on Ways and Means.

On motion, the Recorder was ordered to correspond with the Police Judge of Portland in regard to ordinances affecting the city police.

Bills of night watch were audited and allowed for the last month, aggregating \$120.

All a Blackmailing Scheme.

In the last issue of the REGISTER, we noticed the fact that our Sheriff, Mr. I. C. Dickey, had been arrested in Portland, charged with having committed adultery. We stated our belief that the charge was malicious, and so it has proven, as Mr. Dickey was duly discharged, it appearing to the satisfaction of both the District Attorney and the Police Judge of Portland that the charge preferred by Goforth had no foundation in fact, but was simply a blackmailing scheme. We congratulate our worthy Sheriff on his escape from the machinations of a scoundrel. The following in relation to the matter is from the Oregonian:

It appearing to the satisfaction of the District Attorney and the Police Judge that the charges preferred by Goforth against Sheriff I. C. Dickey, of Linn county, had no foundation whatever, in fact, and that it was for the purpose of extorting blackmail, the defendant was discharged and the case dismissed. Goforth had refused to appear as prosecuting witness in the case, although summoned, and a warrant was issued for his arrest for contempt of court, on motion of District Attorney Caples. He was found last evening and taken to jail, where he is now. His case will come up for trial in Police Court today.

The two following paragraphs are from the Standard:
Sheriff Dickey, of Linn county, was honorably discharged from the charges which brought him into court in the Goforth scandal. The prosecuting witness failed to appear again and his contemptible attempt to blackmail Sheriff Dickey will cost him more than he bargained for. Goforth will try to elude arrest, but it is hardly probable that he will be successful, and he really merits a severe punishment for his attempt to levy blackmail.

We are requested by Messrs. Smith & Young, proprietors of the Occidental Hotel, to state that they consider Mr. Dickey, the gentleman accused of intimacy with Goforth's wife, entirely innocent, and the whole matter a blackmailing scheme of the worst character. This statement is made with Mr. Dickey's knowledge, as they consider him wrongfully accused.

And here is the finale of the matter, taken from Tuesday morning's daily:
"M. L. Goforth, who preferred a charge of adultery against Sheriff Dickey, was called upon by the police court yesterday to answer a charge of contempt of court. He entered a plea of guilty, and Judge Stearns, in order to teach him a wholesome lesson, sentenced the defendant to pay a fine of \$25 and committed him to jail for the period of ten days."

School Matters.

From Mr. J. H. Burkhardt's report we gather the following facts: In this school district (No. 5) there are between the ages of 4 and 20 years, 916 children—423 males, 493 females. In the district schools there are employed five teachers at the present time, whose salaries, average—males \$70; females, \$50. Number of months taught in district schools, 9. Estimated value of school property in the district, \$7,000. Estimated value of globes, charts, etc., used in the schools, \$5. Number of legal voters in the district, 732.

Reid, President; Donald Maclean, Vice President; J. C. Todd, Sec.; Philip G. Renswick, Chief Engineer, and Ellis G. Hughes, Attorney.

The object is to build a narrow gauge road from Salem, through Marion county, into Lebanon and Brownsville, in this county, to Springfield, in Linn county.
