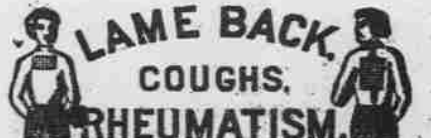

Resolved: That it is the sense of this meeting that our candidates for the Legislature, if elected, use their best endeavors to cut down the rate of interest, and that it will be nearer the natural or general increase of property valuation.

Resolved: That they use their best influence to see that the statute that all loans made within our State be subject to taxation in the county wherein such loan is made.

The County Republican Convention was composed of leading, representative men of the several districts throughout the county, who strove to a man to place in the field an unobjectionable ticket, morally as well as politically. So far as we are able to judge, there was no trading or swapping of any kind, the main thought of each delegate being to secure for each place the man best suited for the duties to devolve upon him. Presidential Indications.

At the close of the Republican County Convention on Wednesday, a vote was taken to get the Presidential leanings, which resulted in 43 for Blaine, 1 for Grant, and 2 for the nominee of the Chicago convention.

Mr. H. F. Suksdorf is Supervisor of the Census for Oregon. The State will be divided into about 75 districts, with one enumerator for each district. The work will commence on the 1st, ending on the thirtieth of June. In the districts densely populated, enumerators will receive a certain amount for each name, farm, factory, etc.; in sparsely settled districts they will receive \$3 per day. Sixty-three applications for positions as enumerators have already been received.

Blaine in the Lead.

At the Republican primary held in Orleans precinct last Saturday, the following resolutions were passed: 1st, That the Legislature reduce the present rate of interest; 2nd, That the fees of County Clerk and Sheriff be reduced or made subject to office; 3d, That the county and State school fund be not used for supporting anything but common schools of the State; 4th, After the business of the meeting was transacted, a vote was taken to decide who was the choice of the voters present for the Presidency, which resulted as follows: Washburne 1, R. B. Hayes 1, Blaine 36.

In investigating the causes that lead to the loss of the British bark *Dithorpe*, the Court of Inquiry found that it was gross negligence on the part of the pilot, Hewitt. When Government has granted the appropriation asked for the improvement of the Aquinas bar, and the improvement is made, there will be no more trouble of account of careless, incompetent or drunken pilots; there will be no more loss of valuable ships and cargoes because of shallow or shifting sands.

State Greenback Convention.

Salem, March 25.—The state greenback convention met at Reed's opera house in this city today. About twenty delegates were present, mostly from Marion, Linn, Benton and Polk counties. T. C. Payne was chosen president and W. A. Henry secretary. The following nominations were made: for Congress—N. L. Butler, of Polk county; Presidential Electors—G. B. Smith, of Benton; W. A. Henry, of Polk; and A. O. Brown, of Washington.

Judicial nominations will be made by the executive committee, consisting of F. O. Payne, chairman, and the chairman of the county central committees.
