LOCAL MATTERS.

Heard From.

Our boys make a reputation wherever they go. The Indianapolis (Indiana) Call of the 20th ult., has this "goak" on Oliver P. Tompkins, of Harrisburg, a delegate from this State to the Chicago Convention:

Mr. O. P. Tompkins, of Harrisburg, Oregon, was in the city last week, visiting Charles N. Lee. He is a genial, pleasant gentleman, and a prominent merchant in the vicinity of his home. He tells the following incident of his visit to Chicago during his journey as a delegate to the national convention. He said: "I sent some shirts, etc., to the laundry one day, and on going to my room the next day, I found my surprise to find three bundles of shirts neatly done up. On opening them, I found my shirts, etc., in one, while the other two contained apparel for a woman and baby, and being a bachelor, I could not imagine what I was to do with garments of that kind. The hotel clerk insisted that they were mine, but I knew better, and left them to the tender mercy of the clerk."

A Pleasant Retreat.

Across the river less than a mile from this city, is the farm of Hon. F. M. Wadsworth, which, by the way, is one of the best conducted little farms in Benton county. Directly in front and but a short distance from the family residence, is a beautiful grove of oaks and among these are arranged comfortable seats and tables, and a nice, large swing. Parties wishing to escape the dust and heat of the city, can find in this grove a cool and delicious retreat, while the largest strawberries, raspberries, blackberries, currants, etc., with sweet cream to wallow them in, can be obtained at the obliging owner for a trifle. Under the trees the grass makes a beautiful velvet carpeting on which one can stretch out at full length, and enjoy the feeling moments. Cross the river, and in the place we have described above, while away a few hours and be happy.

Common Notices.

In Harrisburg precinct there are 167 farms. In Harrisburg there are six main factories. Population of the town is 422; of the precinct, 1,274. During the twelve months preceding June 1st, there were 8 deaths and 48 births. Since the first of June there have been 2 deaths and 2 births. In the precinct there are 50 persons aged 60 and upwards. One marriage during the year where the lady was 55 and the gentleman 60 years. Mrs. Sarah Keys is the oldest person in the precinct, being 85 years of age. Mr. John Kitchen is the oldest male, being 80 years. The east end of the precinct, called Mohawk valley, where the enumerator expects to find not more than 10 to 20 persons; there are 16 families 78 persons, among whom there are 20 voters. They support a school of an average attendance of 30 scholars. They have petitioned for a separate precinct as they are 40 miles from Harrisburg, their present voting place.

In Brownsville and Center precincts there is a population of 1,717. North Brownsville has a population of 307; South Brownsville, 143. In the two precincts there are 45 persons 60 years and upwards; 24 who are 70 and upwards, and 5 who are 80 years and upwards. During the twelve months to June 1st there have been 61 births and 12 deaths. There are 13 productive establishments in the two precincts, 227 farms, 3 saw mills, 2 grist mills, 1 tannery, 1 slaughter and meat packing establishment. There are 4 blind persons, 1 insane person and 1 pauper.

Gone Out with Flying Colors.

On Monday Mr. James Cowan turned over the office of County Clerk to his successor, Mr. N. Baum. The retiring Clerk made an efficient officer, was genial and obliging, and we tender him our thanks for favors extended during the two years in which he so acceptably filled the position. Mr. I. C. Dickey also vacated the office of Sheriff to Mr. Charlton on the same day. No more accommodating or genial gentleman ever collected taxes or served papers than Mr. Dickey; and we are sure no man ever vacated the office with more warm, genuine friends to follow him to the private walks of life, than ex-Sheriff Dickey. Judge Johns also, on the same day, gave way to his successor, Judge Philm, who will, for the next four years, fill the office of County Judge in an able and efficient manner. Judge Johns retired with the best wishes of all for success and prosperity wherever he may cast his lot. We may say of Mr. George Humphrey, who has filled the office of Deputy Sheriff for so many years, that with his reticence the county loses the services of an active, efficient and capable an officer as there is in the business, and who has made hosts of friends all over the county by his courteous manners and promptness in all matters placed in his hands. As Mr. Bruce is his own successor in the office of County Treasurer, we have only to say of him, that he has made a most efficient officer, and the people having found it out, re-elected him. The new officers take hold as if they had been bred to the business, and we predict that county affairs in their hands will prosper as they never have before. Amen.

A number of our citizens talk of going to Yaquina next week. The road is in fine condition we are informed.
